A PROCLAMATÍÖÑ,

For Difcovering and Apprehending any Perlon guilty of the Murder of Thomas Ball, or of any Murder or Robbery in the Streets of London, or Westminster.

GEORGE R. THereas we have received Information, that on the Twenty fourth Day of Ja-nuary last, between the Hours of Six and Seven in the Evening, Thomas Ball was barbaroufly murdered in his own Houfe, in South-wark, by William Blewet, Edward Burnworth, alias Frazier, Emanuel Dickenfon, and Thomas Berry, and four other Perfons unknown, who came armed on purpose to commit that inhuman A&; and whereas the faid Offenders, or others of their Accomplices, have in a most infolent Man-ner menaced several of our Peace Officers, in order to deter them from doing their Duty, and have appeared publickly in the Streets with Fire-Arms, threatning the Deftruction of any that fould endeavour to apprehend them, to the great Terror of our peaceable Subjects, and have also been guilty of divers Robberies committed with open Force and Violence, in the Streets of our Cities of London and Westminster, and the Suburbs thereof, in Defiance of our Laws; We, being firmly refolved to exert our Royal Care for the Prefervation of, the Lives and Properties of our loving Subjects, and to put an effectual Stop to all fuch horrid Practices, have thought fit, with the Advice of our Privy Council, to iffue this our Royal Procla-mation, and do hereby promife and declare, That if any of the Perfons concerned in the faid Murder (except the faid William Blewet, Edward Burn-worth, alias Frazier, Emanuel Dickenfon, and Thomas Berry, and alfo except the Perfon who actually fhot the faid Thomas Ball) fhall difcover the faid William Blewer, Edward Burnworth, alias Frazier, Emanuel Dickenson, and Thomas Berry, or any of them, or any other of the Per-Ions guilty of the Murder of the faid Thomas Ball, to as they may be apprehended and convicted of fuch Offence, fuch Difcoverer shall have our gracious Pardon ; and as a further Encouragement to the Discovery of such notorious Offenders, we do hereby promife and declare, that any Perfon or Perfons (except as before excepted) who fhall difcover and apprehend, or caufe to be difcovered and apprehended, the faid William Blewet, Edward Burnworth, alias Frazier, Emanuel Dickenfon, and

Thomas Berry, or any one or more of them, of any other of the Perfons guilty of the faid Murder or any other Perfon, who, within the Space of two Months last past, hath committed, or hereafter fhall commit, any Murder or Robberý with Force and Violence, in any of the Streets of our Cities of London or Weftminfter, fhall have and receive, for every fuch Offender difcovered and appre-hendended, fo as he may be convicted thereof, the following Rewards; that is to fay, For every one of the Persons herein before particularly na-med the Sum of Three hundred Pounds, and for every fuch other Offender the Sum of One Hundred Pounds, over and above all other Rewards, to which the faid Perfon or Perfons may, by any Act of Parliament be entitled ; which faid refpec. tive Sums the Commissioners of our Treasury, of our High Trealurer of Great Britain for the Time being, are hereby directed and required to pay accordingly, without any further or other Warrant in that Behalf; and if the Perfon fo difcovering and apprehending any Offender guilty of any fuch Murder or Robbery in the Streets, as aforefaids (excepting the Perfon actually giving a Wound in any fuch Murder) fhall have been an Accomplice in fuch Murder or Robbery, and by Reason thereof shall shand in Need of our most gracious Pardon, we do hereby further promife and declare, that fuch Perfon fhall have our most gracious Pardon. And to the End that the Perfons above named may be the more eafily difco-vered and brought to condign Punifhment, We do hereby publish, that we have received the fol-lowing Descriptions of the faid Persons, viz. That William Blewet is above Six Foot high, with black Eye-brows, his Teeth broke before, a hoarfe Voice, and about Twenty eight Years of Age: Edward Burnworth, a well fet Man, of a middle Stature, fair Complexion, and about Twenty five Years of Years: Emanuel Dickenson, a thin Man, about Five Foot Ten Inches high, with a large Scar under his Chin, about Twenty two Years of Age : And Thomas Berry, commonly called Teague, a fhort Man, with dark brown Cloaths, and a natural Wig. And laftly, We do hereby ftriftly charge and command all our Juffices of the Peace, and all other our Officers whatfoever, that they do use their utmost Diligence and Eadeavours, in their feveral Places and Stations, to find out, difcover, and apprehend any fuch Offenders, upon Pain of Our high Displeasure.

God therein, and to blefs His Name for the Hopes we have of being enabled, thro' His Grace, under the Influence of your aufpicious Reign, to carry on a Reformation in the Bounds committed to our Charge, and cannot but with grateful Hearts take Notice of your Majefty's Royal Bounty for maintaining Itinerant Preachers and Catechilts in thefe Parts, where Ignorance and Popery do fo much abound, and fo find it to our fweet Satisfaction and Experience, that God hath raifed up your Majefty to be a Nutfing Father to his Church.

Allow us, Great Sir, to joyn the reft of the Re-formed Chriftian World, and admire your Zeal and indefatigable Labours for the Support and Tranguility of the Protestant Churches abroad, as well as in those Dominions which are by undoubted Right properly your own, by which 'tis obvi-ous, that the Title of Defender of the Faith is more peculiarly due to your Majefty, than to him who first received it : And also rejoyce that God hath remarkably blefs'd your great and noble En. deavours with a more lasting and universal Peace in Europe, fince the happy Day of your Accellion to the Throne of these Dominions, than former Ages can boaft of; which we are perfwaded gives you a Right to the Bleffings entailed upon Peace-Makers.

We will not prefume to lay before your Majefty a diffiner Account of the lamentable State of our Bounds, they being of vaft Extent, more than 400 Miles in Circumference, and yet but Twenty Ministerial Charges therein ; in some Places the Reformation never got any Footing, the People are poor, and without Letters, for Want of Funds to maintain Ministers or Seminaries of Education among them, tho' the Natives be fingularly ingenious, and many of them fond of Knowledge; fo that Popery and Ignorance prevail among us, But now when your Majefly is providing the Means of Knowledge, we hope in a fhort Time the Fruits of your Majefty's Bounty and laudable Endeavours will appear to the great Satisfaction of all fuch as value Religion, or love the Welfare of their Country, fo as to move your Majesty to continue your Royal Grant : For, what Succefs

employ fo glorious an Inftrument as your Majefty to advance and protect the Kingdom of His Beloved Son ; fo that your People want nothing to make them happy but to value and improve their Mercies

Our Work is great, and we have but few Inftruments to be employed in it; but the Caufe is good, and your Majeffy's concerning your felf in ir, gives Life and Vigour to our Endeavours, and is our greatest Encouragement, under God, in whofe Strength we refolve to go on in his own Work, laying our Account with Opposition, yet only from fuch as are Enemies to your Majefty's Perfon and Government.

But as we know it our Duty, fo we make it our Study to inculcate Loyalty into our People, and to have all Vacancies within our Bounds planted with able and well-affected Ministers, that Nothing may be wanting on our Part proper to reduce those under our Inspection, to fear God, and honour the King

The Want of Persons cloathed with your Majefty's Authority and Power of Jurifdiction to ad-ministrate Justice and punish Vice, in many Places, and particularly in the Ifles, and nearest Part to them of the Continent, doth much obstruct this good Work, as well as your Majefty's Service ; fo that it would tend much to the Peace of your Ma-jefty's Government, and Good of your Subjefts, if fit Perfons were commissioned to relide in some of those Places at greatest Distance, to see the Laws duly executed, and Care taken of your Majefty's Intereft.

We pray your Majefty may live long, and have a prosperous Reign; that the Prince and Princes, with their Royal Progeny may be under the Protection of the Almighty, by whom Kings reign, and Princes decree Juffice; and that there may not be wanting one of your illustrious House to sway the Scepter of these your Dominions, until there fhall be Time no more.
