T is faid the Infant Don Manuel of Portugal, who is with their Catholick Majesties at St. A Ildefonfo, will foon receive from Rome a Cardinal's Hat; he having defired it of the Pope, and of late given himfelf up intirely to fpiritual Exercises and Devotions. On the 15th Infant Count Konigfeck, the Imperial Ambafiadour, dif-patched a Courier from St. Ildefonfo to Vienna, with Bills of Exchange and Letters of Credit for 400,000 Pistoles, which this Court remits to the Emperour. Since the 15th feveral Couriers have arrived at St. Ildefonfo from St. Ander and other Ports in Bifcay, with an Account of the Ar-rival of the Squadron under the Command of Sir John Jennings, which had anchored before St. Ander, and some Ships of that Squadron had been in the Port of Santone and taken in Water and other Refreshments : The People in those Parts were under so great Apprehen-fions, that they retired several Leagues up in-to the Country, and the Militia and Troops were posting themselves in several Places along that Coast. Letters from Cadiz of the 13th advile, that the Garrison there is put into the firong-eft Pofture of Defence; and that the Militia of the Province had marched from Xeres to Port St. Mary's, and were employed in making additional Works to the Forts there. The two Spanish Men of War the Conquistador and St. Joseph, failed for Malaga the 7th Instant, to convoy from thence the Provisions and Ammunition which the Spaniards are fending to their Garrifons on the Coaft of Barbary. The Duke de Bournonville, a Flemilh Nobleman and Grandee of Spain, Knight of the Golden Fleece, one of the Lords of the Bed-chamber to his Catholick Majefty, and Captain of the Troop of Walloon Life-Guards, being appointed Ambaffadour to the Court of Vienna, went this Day to St. Ildefonio : He is to return hither the 21st, and to fet out for Vienna very fpeedily.
