ON the 28th of last Month Don Francisco Casado, Son to the Marquess de Monteleon, was married to the late Marquess de Campo Florido's Daughter, with whom he is to have a Portion of 30000 Pistoles. On the 29th a Decree of his Catholick Majesty was published, ordering that each Piece of Eight, in the Weight of which there only wants eight Quarts, which is the sixteenth Part of a Piece, shall pass for full and weighty, but what is wanting above the said eight Quarts shall be made good; and that the Term of carrying the old Money to the Mint in order to be recoined, shall be prorogued till further Orders from his Catholick Majesty. The Infant of Portugal, who has lately been at Alba to pay his Devotions to the Relicks of Santa Teresa, is returned to the Escorial, and is lodged in a Country House of that Convent half a League from thence. Some Days ago Count Vander Nat arrived here from Vienna by the Way of Genoa and Barcelona, as Minister from the Duke of Holstein. His Catholick Majesty has lately sold to the Marquess de St Jago for Two Millions of Escudos, a considerable Part of the Crown Revenue called Terzias Reales; and it is said that the Pasture Grounds belonging to the Crown are also to be sold, in order to raise Sums of Money for the present Emergencies, and for furnishing Subsidies to the Emperour and his new Allies; and the monied Men here are frequently called to the Escorial, and Proposals made to them for finding Money, which at present is extremely scarce here; the King's Treasury being so much exhausted, that even his Household has not been paid this 20 Months past. The late Duke of Ormond with many others of his Party are at the Escorial, where they meet with favourable Receptions. The Duke of Wharton, who gave out for certain that he would go last Saturday to Valencia, and from thence to Rome, is still here and seems to have put off his Departure.

The two Men of War which failed in the Beginning of September from St. Andro, bound for the West-Indies, have been driven back to the said Port by Storm very much damaged: They are still there, and it is taken for granted they will not be able to sail again this Year. Letters from Cadiz of the 29th past relate, that the two Advice-Boats designed for the West-Indies are still in that Port.

Dublin, Oct. 31. Yesterday being the Birth-day of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments on Duty which were drawn out upon Oxmantown-Green. And this Day at Noon the Lords Justices met at the Castle, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction upon this Occasion. And at Night there was a Play given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies.

Westminster, Nov. 10. This Day the Parliament met, and was further prorogued to the 8th of next Month.

Whereas many Persons do still unwarily venture to purchase and wear prohibited East-India Silks and Calicoes, notwithstanding the Act of Parliament of the 11th and 12th of King William, which besides Forfeiture of the Goods, subjects them to a Penalty of Two Hundred Pounds; and whereas the Manufacturers have by proper Officers, in pursuance of the said Act, made many Hundred Seizures, without suing for the Penalty, which has made the Defaulters think it not recoverable; In order therefore to undeceive such People, and prevent their running themselves into such Inconveniency, they think fit to publish the Preamble to the Act of the 10th of King George, Intituled, An Act to prevent Multiplicity of Prosecutions upon an Act made in the 10th and 11th of King William, for the more effectual employing of the Poor, &c. viz. And whereas several Persons have since the said 29th of September 1701, inadvertently made up and used the said prohibited Goods in Furniture and Household Stuff (believing the Act extended to Apparel only) and thereby have subjected themselves to the Penalties of the said Act, which Words, believing the Act extended to Apparel only, plainly shew what the Sense of the Legislature was, i. e. that the Penalty was not only incurred by the Wearers, but even by the Users in Furniture: The Manufacturers being therefore desirous of giving as little cause of Uneasiness to their fellow Subjects as possible, and yet resolved to go vigorously on in prosecuting on the said Act, do think fit to give this publick Notice; and they farther resolve from Time to Time in the publick Prints, to publish the Names and Places of Abode of such Persons on whom shall be made any future Seizures, that the World may see who are the Contemners of the Laws of their Country, and the Incouragers of such clandestine Trade.
