We humbly beg Leave to allure your Ma-jefty, that we will, to our utmost Power, not only most chearfully and readily exert ourfelves in enabling your Majesty to shew a just Resentment for any Injuries done, or Indigni-ty offered to your Majesty and your People; but are ready, at all Hazards, to Support your facred Perfon and Government, and the Protestant Succession in your Illustrious Family; the only Means, we know, of preferving our Conftitution; and expressing our Gratitude to our late Deliverer, King William the Third; of Glorious and Immortal Memory.
