Gibraltar, April 7, O. S. Col Middleton's and Col. Hayes's Regiments arriving here the 26th past, and the same Transports having brought a good Number of Tents; Governour Clayton has caused three Regiments to encamp; and has quartered most of the rest of the Garrison safe from Cannon-Shot and Shells. As yet the Enemy have done us very little Damage, either in our Works, or Loss of Men. The Enemy's Batteries have been in great Disorder for five or six Days past, during which Time they have fired very little; and we are constantly at work in strengthening ours, and making new ones, for which Sir Charles Wager (who with his Squadron came into this Bay the 27th past,) has furnished us with 24 more Cannon; all which will be mounted by Tomorrow Night, the greatest Part being now in our Batteries.

Gibraltar, April 10. O. S. Yesterday arrived Colonel Cosby with 500 Men from Port Mahon. Our Garrison is in great Spirit and perfect Order, and we do not in the least doubt but the Spaniards will repent their undertaking this Siege.

Cassel, May 5. N. S. His Excellency Brigadier Sutton, Envoy Extraordinary of the King of Great Britain, arrived here the 29th of April at Night. The next Day having notified his Arrival to the President Dalnyeh, M. Reydesel Gentleman of the Bedchamber to the Landgrave came to signify to him, that his most Serene Highness was disposed to grant him an Audience the Day following. To this he was accordingly conducted the First Instant in his Highness's Coach, attended by Monf. Reydesel, and several other Gentlemen of his Highness's Court; was very graciously received by his most Serene Highness, and had afterwards the Honour to dine with him.
