**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful Subjects the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Clergy, and Gentlemen of the County of Pembrock, beg Leave to approach your sacred Person (with Hearts full of Loyalty to your Majesty and Affection to our Country,) most humbly to express the grateful Sense we have of your Majesty's great Goodness and paternal Care of your People, which has so eminently appeared in this extraordinary and important Conjunction of Affairs.

We are warmed with a just Resentment and Indignation at the Insolence of those foreign Powers, who, in open Violation of repeated solemn Treaties, and in defiance of all Right, have set up a Trade prejudicial to, and inconsistent with the Interest and Privileges of your Kingdoms, have attacked the valuable and rightful Acquisitions of the British Crown in Spain, and not content with these Outrages, have presumed to offer personal Affronts to your sacred Majesty, and made impotent Efforts to create a Diffidence between your Majesty and your People.

In Conjunction with our Loyal Fellow-Subjects, we shall always most religiously resist all Attempts whatsoever that shall be any where carried on, or have the least Tendency towards bringing us under Popery and Slavery, and shall, at the Expence of our Lives and Fortunes, endeavour to preserve the great Blessings of Liberty and just Administration of Laws, which we now enjoy under the gra-

cious Government of your most Excellent Majesty.

And we humbly desire to assure your Majesty, that we will be ready upon all Occasions, to the utmost of our Abilities, to defend and support your Majesty's sacred Person and our present happy Establishment both in Church and State.
