## Naples, Feb. 13.

(1)N Munday laft the Marquis d'Ajtorgas, our new Vice. Roy, made his publick entry into this place with great folemnity, being accompanied by Don $P e$ dro d' Arragon, our late Vice-Royse together with mot of the Nobility of,this Kingdom, and other perfons of the chiefeft gquality here, who had gone fpate miles out of Town, followed with fotur Troops of Horle, to receive the faid Marquis at mileto, and to conduct him bither; fince which, he hath received the Compliments of all the perfons of note about Town, though as yet he hath not taken poffeffion of the Government, which it is faid, he will not do till Munday next, which done, Don Pedro intends to embark the fame day for $S$ pain, whither moft of his Servants and Goods are already gone.

We are told of a Proclamation that may be very fuddainly Publifued, for the fummoning all Banditi, to render themfelves into the hands of the Civil Magiftrate within a certain time, who are on that condition promifed pardon for what ever they may have heretofore committed. From $\mathrm{P}_{\mathrm{H}} \mathrm{P}$ Lermet they write, that through the extraordinary endeavors of the Prince de Ligne, Vice-Roy of that Kingdom, thofe Inhabitants had of late been reliened with feveral confiderable quantities of Corn, imported from abroad, yet fo, as to leaye them, efpecially the meaner fort, in fome want of it ftill.

Milan, Fcb. 24. We have bad feveral reports here, as if we were in fome danger of being attacked this Summer, and though as yet we cannot much credit them, yet all poffible diligence is every where ufed, for the reinforcing our Garrifons, elpecially on the Frontiers, recruiting oar Forces, and for the good fetling of thefe Countries againft all accidents.

From Turin they write, that the Dutehefs of savjye had been fomewhat indifpofed, occafioned by a fright he received, at the overturning of her A.d, as fhe wastaking her Divertifement init, togeth $r$ with th Duke, and feveral of her Courts in other fleds upop the Snow. From Nice we have an account, of a fad accident thathad lately happened there, which was thus Twelve perfonshawing for fome great offences been condemned to the Galleys, and in the mean time committed to Prifon, one of them took his opportunity, when the Gqaler came to him one Evening, with Food and other neceflities, to kill him, ass he was by accident fooping to the ground, with 20 Iftrument he happened to find there fit for his parpole.e after which, feifing on the Kcys, he goes and releafes all his Companions; who the better - fecure their elcape, Gint Murthet the Goalers Wife, Childrea, and witat Servants were then In the Houfe os which howevers they could not do, but that the noife gave an allarme to the Sentinel that food at the Prifon Gate, who calling others
to his affiltance, entered the Prifan where they rook. Give of thefe wretches, and the next Morning found the feven other dead in the Street, they having 2s is thought, to make their efcape, leaped from a high wally and by the fall been killed.

The Duke d' E/irees. Amballador from his moft Chriftian Majelty to the Pope, is daily expected at Leghorne, on his way to Reme; though in the: mean time, here is much difcoarfe concerning his' reception there.
Ficnna, Fcb. 24. The 21 inftant dyed here the young Impesial Princefs, to the great grief of their Imperial Majeftes, and the whole Court, and yefterday was privately interred in the Capucins Church bere. They of the Reformed Religion in. Hungary, have at length, as is faid, obtanned of the Emperor an aflurance, that they faall fill enar joy their artient Priviledges and Charches, for the exercife of their Religion, provided, they carry them\{elves peaceably, without giving any difturbance to the Government. From 1 pper Hungary they write, of feveral Hoftilities which have been lately committed by the Turks on the Frontiers, they having plundered feveral villages belonging to the Huffars, and killed many of the' Inhabitants, upon which, it is faid, the Eizperos, hath given order for the raifing of more Farces to be fent into thofe Countries, efpecially confider ing the great preparations of the Port, which we canom not be affited, but may be defigned againit this Empire.
nCologne, March 8. The fixth inftant arrived here the Prince of Vaudemont from Bruffels, but may very fuddainly return thithen again with the Re* giment of Foot he is maifing here for the Service of thofe Countries, and which is now almoft coma pleat.

The Marefhal de crequidis daily expected in thefe parts; in the mean time the French Corra miffaries continue to bey aprgigeat quantities of Corn and other Provifions, for their Troops in this Electorate. 0
Bruffels, Mdrch 9. We,feem hete to expect nothing more then a War this Summer, and are therefore making all poffible preparations to put our lelves in a good pofture of defence. It is faid $s$ that the French will have about the middle of the next Month $\$ 2000$ Meri laticharleroy, and that fes veral Troops are already on their march from the other French places thither.
