IS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Mr. Sanderson, Deputy Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Mellage from His Majefty to the Houle of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the Houfe of Peers ; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

- An Act for granting to His Majesty the Sum of Three Hundred and Seventy Thousand Pounds, to be raised by Loans or Exchequer-Bills, to be charged on the Surplus Monies of the Duties on Coals and Culm, granted by an Act of the Fifth Year of His Majesty's Reign for a Term of Years, and fince made perpetual.
- An Act for allowing further Time to Perfons on board the Fleet, or beyond the Seas in His Majesty's Service, to qualify themselves for the legal Enjoyment of Offices and Employments, and for in-demnifying such Persons as have omitted to qualify themselves within the Time limited for that Purpose, and for the better ascertaining such Time.
- An Act for the free Importation of Cochineal during the Time therein limited. An Act for inlarging the Times for hearing and determining Claims by the Trufthe and determining Claims by the Frug-tees for raifing Money upon the Estates of the late Directors of the South-Sea Company and others, and f r Rehief of the Creditors of Robert Knight, Estate Cashire to the said Company, and for Rehief of Persons who have entred Claims for contingent Debts and In-cumbrances, and for giving Time to cumbrances, and for giving Time to Ralph Gulfton and other Creditors of Edward Gibbon, Esq; to enter Claims before the said Trustees for a Debt spe-cified in the Inventory of the said Ed-

# My Lords and Gentlemen,

I Acquainted you at the opening of this Sef-fon with the Dangers which threatned this Kingdom, and the Peace and Liberties of Europe. Iam now to return you my Thanks for the Zeal and Dispatch with which you have proceeded upon the feveral Points I then recommended to your Care, for the Confidence you have reposed in me, and for the Assurances you have given me of your Support and Affiftance in Vindication of my Honour, and in the Maintenance and Defence of the un-doubted Rights and Privileges of this Nation, fo operly and notoriously invaded and attacked.

The Siege of Gibraltar proves beyond all dispute the End and Design of the Engagements entered into by the Emperour and the King of Spain; but the Preparations I had made for the Defence of that Place, and the Bravery of my Troops, will, I doubt not, con-vince them of the Rashness and Folly of that Undertaking. However the Love of Peace has hitherto prevailed upon me, even under this high Provocation, to suspend in some measure my Resentments; and instead of having immediate Recourse to Arms, and demanding of my Allies that Affiftance which they are engaged and ready to give me, I have concurred with the most Christian King and the States General in making fuch Over-tures of Accommodation, as must convince all the World of the Uprightness of our Intenti-ons, and of our fincere Disposition to Peace, and demonstrate to whose Ambition and Thirst of Power the Calamities of a War are to be imputed, if these just and reasonable Proposi-tions are rejected. In the mean Time I have the Pleasure to acquaint you, that the Crown of Sweden has acceded to the Treaty of Hanover, and that the Convention between me, his most Christian Majesty, and the King of Denmark, is actually figned.

It would have been a great Satisfaction to me, if before your Separation I had been a. ble to freak to you more positively, and with greater Certainty, upon the prefent Posture and State of Affairs; but as you have now difpatched the publick Business, and as the Season of the Year requires your geing into your respective Countries, I chocse rather to put an End to this Seffion, than to keep you any longer together unnecessarily. The Previsions you have made, and the perfeti Union and Harmony between me and my Allies, will, I hope, enable me, by the Divine Affiftance, either to withstand and defeat the Designs of our Enemies, if their Conduct shall bring uponus the Necessity of a War; or to improve the Bleffings of Peace, if Peace can with Justice, Honour, and Security be obtained.
