WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects (in the most doubtful Times zealously and most heartily attached to your Majesty and the Protestant Succession in your most august Family) most humbly desire Leave to approach your Royal Majesty in this critical juncture of Affairs, and sincerely assure your Majesty, that with the greatest Cheerfulness we are ready to sacrifice our Lives and Fortunes in Defence of your Majesty, and of those solemn Treaties so wisely entered into by your Majesty to secure the Trade and Commerce of your Subjects, and for keeping the due Balance of Europe.

Your Majesty's great Care for the Welfare of your People, appears in every Particular of your wise Administration, in governing them according to Law, in protecting and encouraging their Trade to its great Increase both at Home and Abroad, and especially in

your Majesty's most wise and happy Choice of your Ministry; these are such Blessings as have procured to us Ease and Quiet in our Minds, and such Riches and Plenty to our Nation, that even our utmost Wishes are exceeded.
