Whitehall, June 15.

Yesterday in the Afternoon arrived a Messenger, with an Account, that our late most Gracious Sovereign King George was seized with a sudden Illness, on the 9th Instant, as he was in his Coach, between Delden and Nordhorn, on his Way to Hanover; His Majesty was presently let Blood, and had such Remedies as were judged proper administered to him; and travelled on to his Highness the Duke of York's at Osnabrug, where he arrived about Ten that Night: But notwithstanding all the Physicians could do for his Recovery, he departed this Life the 11th, about One in the Morning, in the 68th Year of His Age, and the 13th of His Reign: A Prince endowed with all Royal Virtues.

Whereupon the Lords of the Privy Council assembling at Leicester-House, gave Order for proclaiming His present Majesty, who made a most gracious Declaration to them, and caused all the Lords and others of the late King's Privy Council to be Sworn of His Majesty's Privy Council: And this Morning about Ten a-Clock His Majesty was proclaimed; first, in the Court before Leicester-House, where the Officers of State, Nobility, and Privy Counsellours were present, with the Officers of Arms, all being on Foot; then the Officers of Arms being mounted on Horseback, the like was done in Leicester-Square, at Charing-Cross, within Temple-Bar, at the End of Wood-street in Cheapside, and lastly at the Royal Exchange, with the usual Solemnities: The principal Officers of State, a great Number of the Nobility, and of other Persons of Distinction, attending during the whole Ceremony.

Whereas it hath pleased Almighty God to call to His Mercy our late Sovereign Lord King George of Blessed Memory, by whose Decease the Imperial Crowns of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, are Solely and Rightfully come to the High and Mighty Prince George, Prince of Wales: We therefore the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of this Realm, being here assisted with those of His late Majesty's Privy Council, with Numbers of other Principal Gentlemen of Quality, with the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of London, do now hereby, with one full Voice and Consent of Tongue and Heart, Publish and Proclaim, That the High and Mighty Prince George, Prince of Wales, is now by the Death of our late Sovereign, of Happy Memory, become our only Lawful and Rightful Liege Lord, George the Second, by the Grace of God, King of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c. To whom we do Acknowledge all Faith and constant Obedience, with all hearty and humble Affection: Beseeching God, by whom

Kings and Queens do reign, to bless the Royal King George the Second with Long and Happy Tears to Reign over us.

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty, being this Day Present in Council, was pleased to make the following Declaration, viz.

THE sudden and unexpected Death of the King, my dearest Father, has filled my Heart with so much Concern and Surprise, that I am at a Loss how to express myself upon this great and melancholly Occasion.

I am sensible of the Weight that immediately falls upon me, by taking the Government of a Nation so Powerful at Home, and of such Influence and Consequence Abroad; but my Love and Affection to this Country, from my Knowledge and Experience of you, makes me resolve chearfully to undergo all Difficulties for the Sake and Good of my People.

The Religion, Laws, and Liberties of the Kingdom are most dear to me; and the Preservation of the Constitution in Church and State, as it is now happily established, shall be my first, and always my chief Care.

And as the Alliances entered into by the late King, my Father, with foreign Powers, have contributed to the restoring the Tranquility, and preserving the Balance of Europe, I shall endeavour to cultivate those Alliances, and to improve and perfect this great Work, for the Honour, Interest, and Security of my People.

Whereupon the Lords of the Council made it their humble Request to His Majesty, that this His Majesty's most gracious Declaration to their Lordships might be made publick; which His Majesty was pleased to order accordingly.

And that no Person whatsoever for the first six Months put any Escutcheons of Arms painted on their Coaches, nor use any varnished or bullion Nails to be seen on their Coaches, Chariots or Chairs. His Majesty is pleased to permit His Military Officers to appear before him in Red faced with Black.

This Day the Court of Lord Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London waited on His Majesty, and Mr. Baron Thomson Recorder of the said City, made their Compliments to His Majesty in the following Speech,

May it please your Majesty,

THE Court of Lord-Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London, most humbly intreat your Majesty's Permission to declare their Concern for the Decease of their late Sovereign, and to congratulate your Majesty upon your Accession to the Imperial Crown of these Realms.

When they call to Mind that intrepid Valour with which your Majesty early distinguished yourself in Defence of the Protestant Religion and the Liberties of Europe; when they remember that Mildness and Prudence with which your Majesty conducted the Reins of Government when you was Regent of these Kingdoms; how in that short Space of Time your Majesty gained universally the Hearts and Affections of the People; when they consider those inherent Princely Virtues which have rendered your Majesty truly illustrious -- These pleasing and comfortable Reflections, (with all their Expectations agreeably confirmed by your Majesty's most gracious Declaration) yield the utmost Joy and Satisfaction to these your Majesty's most faithful and dutiful Subjects; it gives them a firm Assurance, that your Majesty will repair to them the Loss of your Royal Predecessor, and be an indulgent Father to your People; that your Majesty will protect them in the Enjoyment of their Religion, their Laws and Liberties, and take Delight in promoting their Welfare and Prosperity.

On their Part, they humbly beg Leave to offer their most ardent Wishes for your Majesty's Health and long Life; and your Majesty may depend on the most sincere and hearty Endeavours in their Sphere for the Support of your Majesty and your Government; that they will be vigilant to confirm and establish the Zeal and Affections of your Majesty's Subjects, and do every thing in their Power that your Majesty's Reign may be prosperous and happy.

To which His Majesty was pleased to return the following most Gracious Answer.

I Thank you for the early Marks of Zeal and Affection you have given me on this Occasion.

May it please your Majesty;

THE Court of Lord Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London most

It is with great Satisfaction they observe, that Providence bestows a Crown on your Majesty, instead of that which you was pleased to refuse for the Sake of Truth and Religion: And they presume to be assured, that it will be chiefly agreeable to your Majesty, as it will encrease your Power of doing Good.

They are sensible that they have already many Obligations to your Majesty, more especially for your Care of your Royal Offspring, which fills even their most distant Views with an agreeable Prospect of Felicity.

They beg Leave to wish your Majesty Health and Long Life; that you may be a Comfort and Delight to His Majesty, and have the Pleasure of being the Author of many Blessings to his People.

They had all the Honour to kiss their Majesties Hands: And His Majesty was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood on Robert Baylis, Esq; one of the Aldermen.

Paris, June 22; N. S. By an Express dispatched from the Duke de Richelieu Ambassador from the most Christian King at the Court of Vienna, we have received an Account, that the Preliminary Articles for a general Pacification, were signed there on the 13th Instant by the Plenipotentiaries of the Emperour, France, Spain, and Holland: And, as Mr. Walpole the British Plenipotentiary (to supply the want of an Opportunity of signing in Form the said Preliminaries with a Plenipotentiary of the King of Spain,) had signed an Instrument by Virtue of his full Powers obliging the King his Master to the Observance of the said Preliminaries towards his Catholick Majesty, on Condition that the Duke de Bournonville the Spanish Plenipotentiary at Vienna should sign a like Instrument obligatory on the King of Spain's Part; the Duke de Bournonville did accordingly sign an Instrument of the same Tenour, obliging the King his Master to the Observance of the said Articles towards the King of Great Britain.
