The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the late Act of Uniformity, which establisheth the Liturgy, and Enacts, That no Form or Order of Common Prayers be openly used, other than what is prescribed and appointed to be used in and by the said Book; it is notwithstanding provided, that in all those Prayers, Litanies, and Collects, which do anywise relate to the King, Queen, or Royal Progeny, the Names be altered and changed, from Time to Time, and fitted to the present Occasion, according to Direction of lawful Authority: His Majesty was pleased this Day in Council to declare his Royal Will and Pleasure, that in all the Prayers, Litanies, and Collects for the Royal Family, instead of the Words [His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, the Princes, and their Issue, and all the Royal Family] be inserted [Our Gracious Queen Caroline, the Royal Issue, and the Rest of the Royal Family.] And His Majesty doth strictly Charge and Command, that no Edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed, but with this Amendment; and that in the mean Time, till Copies of such Edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars, and Curates within this Realm do (for the preventing of Mistakes) with the Pen correct and amend all such Prayers in their Church Books, according to the foregoing Direction: And for the better Notice hereof, that this Order be forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several Parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take Care that Obedience be paid to the same accordingly.

WHEREAS at the Time of the Demise of our late Royal Father, of Glorious Memory, this present Parliament stood prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty Seventh Day of this Instant June; and whereas by virtue of an Act of Parliament made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of our late Royal Predecessor Queen Anne, of Blessed Memory, Entituled, *An Act for the Security of Her Majesty's Person and Government, and of the Succession of the Crown of Great Britain in the Protestant Line*, it is required that the said Parliament should immediately after such Demise, Meet, Convene, and Sit, and should Act, notwithstanding such Demise, for and during the Term of Six Months, and no longer, unless the same should be sooner prorogued or dissolved, as in the said Act is provided; and whereas we, with the Advice of our Privy Council, did order that our said Parliament should be prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty Seventh Day of this Instant June, and the same hath been prorogued accordingly: Now we do hereby, with the Advice of our Privy Council, declare our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on Tuesday the Twenty Seventh Day of this Instant June, be held, and Sit for the Dispatch of divers Weighty and Important Affairs; and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses, and the Commissioners of Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster, on Tuesday the Twenty Seventh Day of this Instant June.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

Requiring all Persons, being in Office of Authority or Government at the Decease of the late King, to proceed in the Execution of their respective Offices.

GEORGE R.

Whereas by an Act made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, entituled, An Act for the Security of Her Majesty's Person and Government, and of the Succession to the Crown of Great Britain in the Protestant Line, it was Enacted, That no Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, and Sark, or any of Her Majesty's Plantations, should become void by Reason of the Demise of her said late Majesty, her Heirs or Successors, Kings or Queens of this Realm; but that every Person and Persons in any of the Offices, Places, and Employments aforesaid, should continue in their respective Offices, Places, and Employments, for the Space of six Months next after such Death or Demise, unless sooner removed and discharged by the next Successor, to whom the Imperial Crown of this Realm was limited and appointed to go, remain, and descend; and that all Officers in any Offices, Places, or Employments, who should be by that Act continued, should take the Oaths therein mentioned, and do all other Acts requisite by the Laws and Statutes of this Realm, to qualify themselves to be and continue in such their respective Places, Offices and Employments, within such Time, and in such Manner, and under such Pains, Penalties, and Disabilities, as they should or ought to do, had they been newly elected, appointed, constituted, and put into such Offices, Places, or Employments, in the usual and ordinary Way: We therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure to be, and do hereby direct and command, That all Persons, who, at the Time of the Demise of our late Royal Father, of Glorious Memory, were duly and lawfully possessed of, or invested in any Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within Our Kingdom of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, or Sark, or any of Our Plantations, do, with the first Opportunity, take the respective Oaths of Office, and all other Oaths, as required by the said Act, and in the mean time do not fail every one severally, according to his Place, Office, or Charge, to proceed in the Performance and Execution of all Duties belonging to their respective Offices. And We do hereby require and command all Our Subjects to be aiding, helping, and assisting, at the Commandment of the said Officers and Ministers, in the Performance and Execution

of their respective Offices and Places, as they and every of them tender Our utmost Displeasure, and will answer the contrary at their Perils.

The Lord Marshal's Order for a general Mourning for His late Majesty King George of Blessed Memory.

IN pursuance of an Order of His present Majesty at Leicester-House, the 16th of June 1727. These are to give publick Notice, That it is expected that all Persons upon the present Occasion of the Death of His late Majesty of Blessed Memory, do put themselves in the deepest Mourning (long Cloaks excepted) the said Mourning to begin on Sunday the 25th Instant. And that as well all Lords as Privy Councillors and Officers of His Majesty's Household do cover their Coaches, Chariots and Chairs, and cloath their Livery Servants with black Cloth by Sunday the 2d of July. And that no Person whatsoever for the first six Months put any Escutcheons of Arms painted on their Coaches, nor use any varnished or bullion Nails to be seen on their Coaches, Chariots or Chairs. His Majesty is pleased to permit His Military Officers to appear before him in Red faced with Black. *Suffex M.*

These are to give publick Notice, that it is His Majesty's farther Command, That all Lords Privy-Councillours and Officers of His Majesty's Household who have been ordered to put their Livery-Servants in black Cloth, do also make them wear Shoulder-Knots or Ribbons of the Colour of their Liveries. *Suffex M.*

Lisbon, June 9, N. S. On the 25th past a publick Auto de Fe was held at Coimbra, where Forty one Men and Sixty six Women had each their Sentence pronounced; They were most of them prosecuted for Judaism, and condemned to Banishment or Imprisonment; but none judged so obstinate and impenitent as to be delivered over to the secular Arm. His Portuguese Majesty, in regard to the many Services of Sig. Guedes Pereira, late Envoy Extraordinary at the Court of Spain, has granted him the Alcaidaria Mor of Lamego, and the Revenue of Mouram in the Order of Aviz, as also the Lordship of a Village consisting of 200 Inhabitants. His Portuguese Majesty has appointed Joan Jaques de Magalhaens to be Governor and Captain General of Mazagam. The 30th past being St. Ferdinand's Day, the Marquês de los-Balbases his Catholick Majesty's Ambassadour Extraordinary, in Honour to the Prince of Asturias, who bears that Name, gave an Entertainment, at which most of the Nobility were present. The 6th Instant, being the Prince of Brazil's Birthday,

Day, the Nobility appeared at Court, and had the Honour of kissing their Portuguese Majesties and his Highness's Hands.

Hague, June 24, N. S. The States of Holland assembled on Saturday last, and adjourn'd to the 8th of next Month, which Day they have fixed for the Election of a Pensionary in the Room of M. Hornbeck deceased: In the mean while, they have put the Seals into the Hands of M. de Boetselaer.
