HIS City having some Days since sent a Deputation from their Body to Bath, to congratulate her Royal Highness the Princels Amelia on her Arrival in these Parts, to wish her a per-sect Recovery of her Health, and also to de-sire she would be pleased to honour this City with her Presence, they received Notice Yester-day, that her Royal Highness intended to come by Water this Day. Upon which immediate Orders were given to make all the Preparations possible on so short a Warning, that they might in the best Manner shew their Duty and Loyalty, and Joy for the Honour intend-

ed them.

Her Royal Highness accordingly came by Water, attended by several Barges with Musick. Her Royal Highness was accompanied by the Lady Pomfret, with the Dutchels of Rutland and the Lady Frances Manners: Her Royal Highness landed between Eleven and Twelve, the Mayor, Aldermen and Corporation in their Scarlet Gowns attending to receive her, with several of the neighbouring Gentlemen of the Country, at a handsome Stage covered with Scarlet built at the Place of landing, a Guard of Lord Tyrawley's Regiment attending. Upon her landing 21 Guns were fired. Her Royal Highnels's Chair was ready to receive her, as likewise her own Coaches. The Mayor and likewise her own Coaches. The Mayor and whole Corporation walked before her Chair, and conducted her thro' the principal Streets, where the Houses were all adorned with rich Carpets, Scarlet Cloth, &c. to the House of Alderman Day, in the Great Square, provided for her Royal Highness's Reception. After resting some little Time, her Royal High-ness admitted the Mayor and Corporation, and the Town Clerk congratulated her Royal Highness on her Arrival; and they all had the Honour to kiss her Hand. Immediately after, the Dean of Bristol and the Clergy were presented, and the Dean congratulated her Royal Highness on her Arrival. Next the Commander of Lord Tyrawley's Regiment presented his Officers, and the Collector the Officers of the Revenue.

Soon after, her Royal Highness took her own Coach, and proceeded through Queen-Square to see the Key of Bristol, where were near 100 Sail of Ships all adorned wirli their Colours; thence to the College-Green and the Cathedral, and from thence came back to the Merchants Hall, where all the Ladies of the Town were affembled, and the Mayor and Corporation. Her Royal Highnels walked up between them, and being feated in the uppermost Room in a Chair of State. Mrs. Mayores was presented, and affect their college. State, Mrs. Mayoress was presented, and afterwards all the rest of the Ladies, who had the Honour to kils her Hand. From thence her Royal Highness went to Mr. Alderman Day's to dine privately, as she had defired, where the Lords and others who attended 'her Royal Highness, were likewise entertained. My Lords and Gentlemen,

His Majesty's gracious Condescention in departing from His own Right, by leslening His hereditary Revenue for the Ease of the Subject, and the Encouragement of Trade, shews His Royal Concern for the Welfare and Happiness of this Kingdom, and, together with many other fignal Marks of His Majesty's Goodness, must convince us, that His Majesty has nothing more at Heart than the Inte-

rest and Prosperity of His People.

The Foundations laid for the Encrease of Tillage, so necessary in this Country; the new Advantages given for the Improvement of the Linnen Manufactures; the Care taken for regulating the Affize of Bread; the establishing a Fund for the Work-House, and for employing the Poor in this populous City; the Relief given to unfortunate Debtors; the Regulation made for future Elections; the reducing your Parliamentary Priviledges for the Ease and Benefit of your Fellow-Subjects; and those other excellent Laws now passed, for erecting Churches where they are most wanted; for the better Maintenance of the Clergy, and for preserving and strengthning the Protestant Interest of this Kingdom, will, I persuade myself, be so many memorable Instances of the Worth, Honour and Wisdom of this Parliament.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I am commanded by His Majesty to return you Thanks for the Supplies, which in the most chearful Manner you have unanimously given for the Support of the Establishment, and for proceeding in the Measures the late House of Commons had begun, effectually to enable His Majesty to continue the Forces in fuch a Condition, as may contribute to dilappoint all Attempts of His Enemies.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

The publick Bulinels being now over, and your own Affairs calling you to your several

Countries, I can make no Doubt, but you will, in your respective Stations, exert your selves in promoting His Majetty's Service, with the same Zeal and Spirit which you have shewn in the Course of this Selsion, and which so highly becomes a People truly sensible of the Happinels they enjoy under His Majesty's most gracious Government.

I think myself obliged at this Time, when Corn bears so excessive a Rate, to recommend to your particular Care, the preventing all Abuses of Forestallers and others which may enhance the Price of it, to the Detriment of the Kingdom, and the Oppression of the Poor.

Nothing could be more acceptable to me, than to find by the Addresses of both Houses, that my Endeavours for the publick Service have been to your Satisfaction: The many Marks of Loyalty and Affection which you have shewn to His Majesty's Sacred Person and Royal Family, during my Administration, lay me under the highest Obligations to promote the Good of this Kingdom upon all Occasions to the utmost of my Power; and I shall, on my Return into His Majesty's Presence, make a faithful Representation to His Majesty of your most loyal and dutiful Behaviour.
