Hague, July 9. Van Beuningen tells us, That by an Express of the 9th of June, Beaufort had Orders sent him to make all haste with his Fleet this way, but yet appears no further News of him.

The Pensionarie de Witt and Vander Holle, have made their Report in the Assembly, of the Fleets taking the Sea from Zealand, and that Tromp is since followed from Gorce. That we shall be in all 90 Sail Men of War, besides Fireships. Harwich, July 3. On Munday our Spy being sent out, made the Dutch fleet off the Longfand Head, and faith, they Were about 80 sail; he saw sour Flags, all Admirals, no Vice-Admirals or Rere-Admirals. About 7 or 8 of the clock he shoot off sair, having the wind of them, and hovered there a good while: At last, they sent two small ships after him, and one of them chacing him, he bare away till flacking, he tack'd upon her and fired four of his Guns upon the Dutchman, and so she stood to her sleet, and our Spy into our Harbor. The Dutchman he supposed to be a Ketch. One of the men of the Soy faith politively, That they are about 80 fail, another among them reckening the small Fix, with the other, judged them about 104 fail, of which he supposes 80 to be Men of War, the rest Ketches.

A Ketch or small Hoy went out hence this morning, and cff of Balley Cliffes, was taken by a small Vessel or Sloop of the

About five of the Clock in the Afternoon we faw the Datch fleet very plainly, and from our Land, by the Beacen we discerned four Flaggs, and we judge them not so numerous as former reports have made them 3 they feemed then to stand in for the Land, but about 7 we saw them cast off further into the Sea, yet plainly to come to an Anchor.

This Evening betwitt 9 or 10 of the clock, our Spy being out about the Romling Grounds, and off the Cliff, faw a Shallop of the enemies force 2 Hoy of ours a shore near the Cliff; but our Spy gave chace to the Durch Shallop, fired on her some Guns, and forced her toward the Forc of Landguard-Point, who bestowed some Guns upon her also, and presently took ker, she was man'd but with three men (a light nimble thing) and yet prizes were their trade. The Coptain being examined, delivered his Commission and Papers, and faith, being brought in this morning, that about 14 days fince he came out of Horn, and had fix men belonging to his Shallop, and that three of his men descrited him at Flushing; that he had no more then three when he was taken; that de Ruyter promised 7 or 8 men, if he would go to the flore to make difcovery; but he had them not.

That the Dutch Fleet have been out fince Sunday last was Sennight, and stood first for the Coast of Flanders. The there were none of the French among them as yet; that they creputed them to be beyond the Sorlings. That the Holland Fleet came 3 or 4 dayes before him out. That many Merchants ships set to Sea daily out of their Harbors. And the Two

other Men examined apart, agree to all that the first hath said.

Dover, July 3. Two great Hamburgh ships sailed by the last night richly laden bound for London. Yesterday a French Shallop lay before the Hithe, and by a fhot made into the Town, alarm'd the people into a posture of desence. On Sunday fail'd by three of the Kings ships, whereof the Garland was one, with about 1000 able Seamen for the service of the fleet.
