*Fontainebleau, Nov. 2, N. S.*

**S**INCE the 29th past nothing particular has happened in the King's Illness; the Small Pox having continued to come out in the best and most regular Manner, His Majesty having been without Pain or Fever, and having slept without Interruption many Hours every Night; the preceeding Pustules drying up and disappearing gradually, as the others rose and came to a Suppuration, and now the Pustules are all dried and falling off. So that all Danger and Apprehension were over two Days ago. Yesterday the King changed Linnen. On Thursday the 4th Instant he will change his Apartment, and on Saturday or Monday next be purged; so that the Departure of the Court from hence is fixed for the 22d, when it is thought they will go to Marly, to continue there till Christmas. Two of the King's Ships were launched the 20th past at Havre, the one called the Ruby destined for Martinique, the other called la Gironde to go to Toulon. M. Boudin, formerly Physician to the Dauphin, and first Physician to the Queen, is dead; and is succeeded by M. Helvetius. M. d'Armenonville, Father to M. de Morville, and formerly Keeper of the Seals, has received the Sacraments, and is at Extremity. Her most Christian Majesty went this Morning in Devotion to a Convent at Morette, a little Town two Leagues from hence.

Yesterday Sir Robert Baylis, Kt. Lord Mayor Elect for the Year ensuing, was Sworn at Guildhall, and Sir Edward Becher, Kt. the late Lord Mayor, surrendered to him the Chair and other Ensigns of Mayoralty in the Manner accustomed.

This Day the new Lord Mayor, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Recorder, and Sheriffs in their Scarlet Gowns, went in their Coaches to the Water-Side, the Sword and Mace being carried before them, and the City Officers attending; and from thence proceeded in the City Barge, attended by the several Companies in their respective Barges adorned with Streamers and Pendants to Westminster; and having walked round the Hall and solemnly saluted all the Courts, they went to the Exchequer-Bar, and the Lord Mayor did there take the Oaths appointed, and having recorded Warrants of Attorney in the proper Courts, returned by Water to Black-Friers, and from thence in Coaches with the usual Solemnity to Goldsmith's-Hall, where a magnificent Entertainment was provided, at which were present the Great Officers of State, divers of the Nobility, Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, the Judges, and other Persons of Quality and Distinction.
