HE Dutchess of Luxembourg is brought to Bed of a Daughter. On the 11th Instant there was a Funeral Service performed in the Church of the Fathers de Nazaret, for the Repose of the Soul of the late Duke de Sully. The Abbot Boutard, Commander of the Order of St. Lazare, Pensionary of the Royal Academy of Inscriptions and Belles Lettres, Abbot of Boisgroland in the Diocese of Suyon, and Prior of Chateau Renard, is dead. On the 13th Instant M. de Montholon First President of the Parliament of Metz, and M. de Gaubert First President of the Parliament of Fidelity to his most Christian Majesty at Versailles. On the 15th the Count d'Avejan, Captain-Lieutenant of the first Troop of Mousquetaires, was received by the King at the Head of that Troop. M. Pelletier, the Comptroller-General, was received the 17th Instant by the Parliament as Governour of

Hague, March 25. The Deputies of the several Admiralties in these Provinces had a Conference on the 22d Instant with the States General, and made a Report of the State of the Navy, and agreed on the Number of Ships to be employed for the Service of this Year; as also on the fitting out of the Dutch Squadron to be sent in the Month of May to the Mediterranean, which 'tis said will consist of Seven or Eight Ships. The Directors of the Dutch East India Company have agreed on a Dividend of 25 per Cent. on their Stock, and to begin the Payment of it on the Second of May. The States General have ordered a new Lottery to be made for this Year, of 'Two Millions and Five Hundred and Thirty Thousand Florins, of 80 Florins a Ticket, to be divided into Five Classes; to be paid in, the Two First 10 Florins each, the Third 15, the Fourth 20, and the Fisth 25 Florins. The Drawing of it is to begin here on the 7th of June next. This Morning five Malesactors, found guilty of discovering the Secrets of the Republick to Foreigners, and selling Copies of the Resolutions and Dispatches of the States, received their Sentences, viz. Mr. Hamelonse, who was Clerk in the States Secretary's Office, and Mr. Tromer, Clerk of the Province of Overyssel, were carried to a Scassold built for that Purpose in the Square near the Prison, and being made to kneel down, their Hands bound, the Hangman passed a large Scimitar over their Heads; they

are to remain in Prison for Ten Years, and their Estates are forseited. Wessen, the Keeper of the House here belonging to the Deputies of Leyden, was also carried up the Scasfold and declared infamous. Scaremberg, an Advocate, and Linde, an Attorney, who were concerned with the others in their Crimes, have been banished their Country for Lise.
