**O**N the 11th Instant, at Nine in the Morning, his Majesty set out from Herrenhausen, and about Noon arrived at Lintzbourg, formerly a Hunting-Seat; from whence he went to see his fine Horses in that Neighbourhood, and in the Evening arrived at Hoyer. The 12th his Majesty set out from thence at Eight in the Morning for Stade, where he arrived at Four in the Afternoon. All the Guns on the Ramparts were fired, and the Inhabitants were under Arms, the Bells were ringing, and all possible Demonstrations of Joy shewn. The 13th, at Nine in the Morning, the King left Stade, and arrived at Three in the Afternoon at Harbours, and was received there in the same Manner as at Stade. The 14th in the Afternoon his Majesty was pleased to take a View of the River Elbe, in a Pleasure-Boat; but the Wind growing very high, and the Weather rainy, he was obliged to return to Harbours, after having been at Wilhelmsbourg. At Night Lieutenant Colonel Bruggeman played off a very fine Firework, for his Majesty's Entertainment. The 15th his Majesty left Harbours at Eight in the Morning, and at One a-Clock arrived at Lunenburg. The Guns were fired from the Ramparts and the Castle, and the Inhabitants were under Arms: There were likewise two triumphal Arches erected, and a general Joy was shewn throughout this City. At Night all the Streets were illuminated, as they were also the two following Nights. On the 16th early in the Morning, the Deputy-Governor, Treasurer, and whole Body of English Merchants Adventurers, residing at Hambour, were introduced to His Majesty by the Rt. Hon. the Lord Viscount Townshend, and presented the following Address,

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,  
*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E your Majesty's most faithful and loyal Subjects the Merchants Adventurers of England residing in Hambour, humbly beg Leave to lay ourselves at your Majesty's

Feet, to congratulate you on your Arrival in these your Dominions, and to implore the Continuance of your Royal Favour and Protection.

The Exportation of the Woollen Manufactures of England, with which your faithful and loyal Company have been long intrusted, hath been attended with those considerable Advantages to our Nation, that the successive Princes of Great Britain have been pleased to distinguish our Society by Grants of particular Privileges, which have been continued to us for above Three Hundred Years by the Favour of your Royal Predecessors.

It is with great Pleasure that we reflect on a long Race of Kings who have been our Patrons; and we think it our greatest Happiness, that we are at present under the Protection of a Monarch of known Justice and Goodness, and who hath so much at Heart the Preservation of the Liberties, and the Trade of his Kingdoms.

May God long preserve your Sacred Majesty, together with the best of Queens, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, and all your most illustrious Family, which gives us a large Prospect of the same Blessings being conveyed down to our latest Posterity.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer.

Gentlemen,

*I Thank you for this Instance of your Duty and Affection: You may always depend upon my Protection and Countenance.*

His Majesty was also pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon John Emmerlon, Esq; their Deputy-Governour.

About Nine His Majesty proceeded to the Review of His Troops assembled near this Place, consisting of Ten Squadrons, and Eight Battalions; His Majesty rode from the Right to the Left of the Line, and afterwards went to a magnificent Tent which was there prepared,

pare 1 and the Horse first passed by His Majesty by Pours, and the Foot by Sub-Divisions. At which the Horse dismounted and marched by His Majesty on Foot. The Troops made a very fine Appearance, and the whole of this Day's Review was concluded by a *Feu de Joye*. About Nine the same Evening the People employed in the Salt Works of this City, all cloathed in White, and each carrying a Branch of Candles in his Hand, walked up to the Palace in Procession, and ranged themselves in a Circle under the Window, where the King stood to observe them. Several Instruments of Musick were placed in the Centre, and in this Manner they continued for some Time, singing, and making loud Acclamations. Yesterday the King reviewed the whole Body of Horse and Dragoons, and saw them perform their Exercise, first on Horseback; they then dismounted, and went through the other Parts of it, by Firing in Files, in Platoons, in Ranks, and in Divisions; this done they remounted, drew up in two Lines, and charged each other on Horseback several Times with the greatest Dexterity and Exactness. This Day His Majesty will review four Regiments of His Infantry, and the rest of them To-morrow, and on the 20th His Majesty proposes to set out for the Ghorde, and to dine there that Day.
