**O**N Wednesday last Prince Gallitzin arrived here with the Character of Minister Plenipotentiary from his Czarish Majesty, and the next Day he had a private Audience of the King of Prussia. Colonel Polentz, who has resided here for some Time, as Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Poland, is recalled, so that there is no Person here at Present on the Part of that Court.

*Dresden, Jan. 14, N. S.* General Zulich fet out for Warfaw this Morning, the King having given him an Audience of Leave last Thursday, when he had the Honour of dining with his Majesty. Colonel Polentz, who has resided as Minister from this Court at that of Berlin for some Months past, arrived here Yesterday; and *vis* said M. Suhms is to return thither soon, only to take his Leave, Count Leonard, one of the King's Chamberlains, being named to succeed him.

*Copenhagen, Jan. 17, N. S.* Their Danish Majesties are at Friedensbourg, but are expected in Town about the End of this Week. The Resident of Muscovy has notified to this Court the Declaration of the Czar's Marriage with the Princess Dolgorucki. Colonel Haxthausen, who commanded a Regiment of National Dragoons, has succeeded to the Command of the Queen's Regiment, vacant by the Death of G. M. Vander Luke.
