To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Commons House of Assembly in your Majesty's Province of South Carolina.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on your safe Arrival in Great Britain,

As we, in common with the rest of your Majesty's faithful People, partake of the Inexpressible Blessings of your wise and gracious Administration; so with sincere Thanks to divine Providence, we receive the welcome News of your Return in good Health to your Royal Consort our most gracious Queen, who by her prudent Administration (during your Absence) has not only endeared herself to your dutiful Subjects, but to their perfect Satisfaction, preserved the Peace and Quiet of your Kingdoms.

It's with the utmost Pleasure and Satisfaction that we behold your Majesty extending your paternal Care and Concert over all your People, tho' never so remote from your Royal Person; and the fresh Instance which your Majesty has given us of your particular Regard for the welfare of this Colony, in purchasing the Soil thereof, a Blessing never to be forgotten, calls upon us in Point of Interest and Gratitude, as well as Duty and Obedience, to tender unto your most gracious Majesty, now our Lord and Proprietor, our most sincere and unfeigned Thanks.

To assure your Majesty of our firm Adherence and Attachment to your Royal Person and Government, and that we shall never be wanting to use our utmost Endeavours to support and defend a Colony now so eminently distinguished by your Royal Favours, is only to assure you, that we shall pursue our own Interest, which is inseparably united with our Duty.

That your Majesty's Reign over us may be Long and Prosperous; that your Royal Issue may continue to increase and multiply, and successfully Rule over and Govern your faithful Subjects to the latest Posterity, are the most humble and hearty Prayers of,
