Moscow, February 16, O. S.

Yesterday her Czarish Majesty made a very splendid Entry into this City; when her Majesty arrived at Fscaweatzhoy, a little Village about six Miles from hence, she declared herself Colonel of the Regiment of the Preobrazensky Guards, and Captain of the Horse Guards. At this Village the High Council and Senate waited on her Majesty, the Great Chancellor Count Golofkin presented to her the Order of St. Andrew, and Demetry Michaelowitz Galitzin humbly thanked her in the Name of the said Council and Senate, for having been graciously pleased to accept of the Crown, and sign the Articles which were carried to her Majesty at Mittau for the good Government of Russia; to which she made a suitable Answer, promising to perform the said Articles, and to do every thing on her Part that might be for the Benefit of their Country.

Vienna, March 22, N. S. Monsr. Braw, Envoy Extraordinary at this Court from the Duke of Brunswick-Wolfenbuttel, having had his Audience of Leave of their Imperial Majesties, designs to set out this Evening for Ratisbon. On the 17th Instant Cardinal d'Altham set out for Rome to assist at the Election of a new Pope.

Paris, April 5, N. S. The Abbot de Bezons is made Bishop of Carcassone. The Marshal d'Huxelles having resigned the Post of Lieutenant-General of the Government of Burgundy, and the Government of the Town and Citadel of Chalons sur Saone, is succeed-

ed by the Marquess de Beringhen. M. Trudaine is made Intendant of Auvergne. The Count de Caraman, M. d'Orcau, and the Marquess de Fiemarcon, are dead. The Marquess de Bonac is made Lieutenant-General of Roussillon, in the Place of M. Fiemarcon. The King's Lieutenantcy of Rochelle, vacant by the Death of M. de Nocé, is given to M. de Chambon. On the 28th past the King's Attorney and Solicitor-General brought to the Parliament a Declaration from his Majesty, containing several Articles, to put a Stop to the Disputes arisen on Account of the Bull Unigenitus; which being taken into Deliberation, it was concluded that Commissaries should be appointed to settle it. On the 3d Instant the King went to the Parliament and held a Bed of Justice, and said the Chancellor would declare to them his Intentions, which were, that they should register a Declaration dated the 24th of last Month, to confirm all the Ordinances published heretofore in Favour of the Bull Unigenitus, and to enforce a general Acceptation of it, the King being willing, as the Chancellor said, to make a Law of State of what had already been made a Law of the Church. And the Declaration was register'd accordingly.

Hague, April 7, N. S. The Deputies from the Province of Zealand had several Conferences lately with those of the States, about altering the new Tariff or Book of Rates on all Goods imported or exported; but without Success. They likewise solicited for some Alterations in the Trade to Africa, but being opposed strongly by the West-India Company,
