**T**HE Conferences between the Deputies of the West-India Company and those of the Province of Zealand have been hitherto without Effect, though continued every Day. The Magistrates of the City of Einbden have made fresh Application to the States General upon their being threaten'd with an Aulic Decree, declaring them Rebels, and also menacing them with the Ban of the Empire, notwithstanding all the fair Promises given them from the Court of Vienna. Several Persons of Quality here are preparing to set out this Week to see the Encampment of the King of Poland's Forces, among whom are Count Maurice of Nassau and his Son. The Prince of Nassau-Siegen and Prince William of Hesse-Philippstadt, who are both in the Service of the States, the former a Colonel of a Regiment of Foot, and the latter of a Regiment of Horse, arrived here some Days ago. The Sister of the former, and Relict of the Prince d'Anhalt, is married to the Count de la Lippe, Son of the Countess of Buckenbourg.
