The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

This Day the Right Honourable Robert Lord Bingley Treasurer of His Majesty's Household; the Right Honourable Sir Conyers Darcy, Knight of the most Honourable Order of the Bath Comptroller of His Majesty's Household, and the Right Honourable Sir William Strickland, Bart. His Majesty's Secretary at War, were, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective Places at the Board accordingly.

Windsor, June 12.

On Wednesday last their Majesties, with his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, his Royal Highness the Duke, the Princess Royal, and their Royal Highnesses the Princesses Amelia, Carolina, Mary and Louisa, came hither about Four a-Clock in the Afternoon from Richmond; immediately upon their Arrival, his Grace the Duke of St. Albans, High Steward of this Corporation, with the Mayor, Aldermen and John Owen, Esq; the Recorder, waited on their Majesties; and Mr. Recorder made them a very handsome Speech, in the Name of the Corporation, suitable to the Occasion, at which their Majesties expressed great Satisfaction. In the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy. And Yesterday being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Succession to the Crown, there was a numerous and splendid Appearance at Court of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment their Majesties thereupon; and the like Demonstrations of Joy were shewn throughout the whole Town as the preceding Night, which were concluded by a magnificent Ball in the Town-Hall.

Excise-Office, London, June 9, 1730.

Whereas by an Act passed in the 2d Year of his present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for laying a Duty upon Compound Waters, or Spirits, and for licensing the Retailers thereof, It is enacted, That from and after the first Day of July then next ensuing, all Manner of Persons are obliged and required to take out a Licence for the Selling or Retailing any of the mixed or compound Spirits or Liquors, as in the said Act are particularly mentioned, ten Days at least before they shall offer to sell or retail the same in any Quantity less than a Gallon, and likewise obliged and required to take out a fresh Licence for that Purpose ten Days at least before the Expiration of Twelve Months after taking out such Licence, and in the same Manner to renew such Licence from Year to Year, paying down the Sum of Twenty Pounds at the Time of taking out the first Licence, and also the further Sum of Twenty Pounds at such Time as by the said Act they are required to renew such Licence on Pain of forfeiting the Sum of Fifty Pounds. His Majesty's Commissioners of Excise do hereby give Notice, That from and after the Nineteenth Day of this Instant June, proper Persons will be appointed to deliver out and renew the Licences for the Purposes aforesaid, at the Chief Office of Excise in London, to such Persons as shall live within the Limits of the Penny Post; and without the Limits of the Penny Post, at the Excise-Office next adjoining to the Place where the Person that shall take out or renew such Licence shall inhabit or reside, and to receive the aforesaid Sum of Twenty Pounds at the Time of delivering or renewing the same.

The Commissioners for Licensing Hawkers and Pedlars do hereby give Notice, that daily Attendance will be given at their Office in Holbourn-Court in Gray's Inn, N^o 9. from Monday the 15th Day of June 1730. (Sundays and Holidays excepted) from 9 a-Clock in the Morning till Twelve, and from Two till Five in the Afternoon, in order for delivering out yearly Licences as usual. And all Persons concern'd are hereby desired to apply to the said Office in London for Licences, before Midsummer next, and not to depend upon the uncertain meeting with the Surveyors in the Country, who have strict Orders given them to endeavour to convict and levy the Twelve Pounds Penalty on all such Hawkers as they shall at any Time of the Year find trading without Licences.
