This day was performed the Enserment of the Right Honograble Edward Earl of Sandwich, whole, Body was taken up at Sea, after the late Engagement of His Majesties Fleet with the Dutch, in which this Noble Earl so extraordinarily figualized his Courage and Conducts that his Majesti out of a high sense of his Honour and Merit was pleased to order his Enterment to be at His Majesties expence; whereupon all things being prepared for the proceeding from Deptford, where the Body was taken out of one of His Majesties Yachts, it was in the order following.

First, a Mourning Barge covered with Cloth, in which were the Standard and Guidon, born by two Gentlemen of Quality, two Officers of Arms;

Trumpets and Drums all in Mourning.

A second Barge also covered with Cloth, in which were fix Officers of Arms in their Coats, bearing the Coats, of Arms, Helm and Crest, and Sword, Target, Gauntlet and Spurs of the Defunct, the Greate Bannor being placed at the head of the Barge.

A third Barge covered with Velvet, in which was the Body covered with a large Sheet, and Pall of Velvet, adorned with Escurcheons, and an Earls Coronet upon a Velvet Cushion at the head, six Bannerols being failned on the outside of the Barge; at the head was the Flag of Union, and at the Stern fix Trumpets with Banners, the top of the Brige was adorned with fix Plumes of of the Binge was adorned with its Plumes of black Feathers, and in the midlt upon four Shields of his Arms, joyning in point, an Earl Coronet. Ithem, took their Places at the Board accordingly.

That the Burgermasters and Common Coun- 1 The fourth Mourning Barge for the Chief Mourner, covered with Cloth without any Ornaments; after which their Majesties and Royal Highnesses, Barges with divers others of the Nobility as well as of the Lord Mayor, and the several Companies of the City; as the proceeding passed by the Tower the Great Guns were discharged there.

In this order they passed from Deptford, and about 5 a clock in the evening came to-Westminster Eridge, where the Body was taken out of the Barge, and proceeded thence to the Abby in manner following.

On each fide of which, were the fix Bannerols, carried by fix persons of Quality, and of Relation to the Defunct.

After the Body, Gatter Principal Kings of Arms, between two Gentlemen Ushers, preceding the chief Mourner, whose Tra n was born by a Gentleman, then followed 8 Earls Affistants, all in Mourning Gowns and Hoods; then divers of the Nobility, Privy Councel, and persons of Quality, according to their respective Dignities, preceded by a Gentleman Usher in short Mourning,

In this Order they proceeded to the West end of the Abbey, (through a double Lane of His Majesties Guards, who were drawn up on both fides the Streets,) where the Dean, Prebends, and Quire received them, and so up into Heary the Sevenths Chappel, where the Body was Enterred in a Vault, on the North Side of the Quire, which done, the Officers broke their White Staffs, and Garter proclaimed the Titles of this most Noble Earl Deceaſed.
