**T**HE King has been pleased to appoint Walter Titley, Esq; to be his Majesty's Resident with the King of Denmark.

His Majesty has been pleased to constitute and appoint his Grace the Duke of Argyll to be Governour and Captain of the Town and Isle of Portsmouth in the County of Southampton, and of the Castle there called South Sea Castle, and of the Forts, Block-houses and Fortifications belonging to the same, in the Room of George Macartney, Esq; Lieutenant-General of His Majesty's Forces, deceased.

As also to appoint his Excellency James Earl Waldegrave His Majesty's Ambassadour Extraordinary at the Court of France, to be one of the Gentlemen of His Majesty's Bed-chamber, in the Room of his Excellency the Earl of Chesterfield.

His Majesty has been pleased to grant his Confirmation of the Title and Possession of the Archdeaconry of Durham, with the Rectory of Easington to the same appropriate, in the County Palatine and Diocese of Durham, unto George Sayer, A. M. to which he was collated by the Right Reverend William late Bishop of Durham, and inducted into the same after the said Bishop's Decease.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Donald Mc'Neile, Esq; a reduced Captain of Colonel Maurice Nassau's late Regiment of Foot, to be Captain of a Company in His Majesty's own Royal Regiment of Welch Fuziliers, commanded by Lieutenant General Joseph Sabine.

*Whereas in the Month of September last several Letters were sent to Mr. George Packer, of the City of Bristol, Merchant, and one to his Sisters who lived in his House, requiring that a certain Sum of Money should be left in particular Places described in the said Letters, threatening, if the same were not complied with, to murder*

murder them, and to burn his House, and accordingly on Saturday the 3d of October Instant, about Twelve of the Clock at Night, his said House was set on Fire, and entirely consumed, whereby the Ships at the Key and the whole City were in great Danger of being also set on Fire; and since the burning of the said House, two Letters have been conveyed to the said Mr. Packer, threatening, if he did not leave a larger Sum of Money at a Place appointed, to murder him and his Sisters, to burn every House he should live in, and that the City before it were long, should be all in Flames: For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person concerned in a Crime of so high a Nature, and attended with so much Barbarity and Villany, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof; and also a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to such Person, or to any other Person or Persons making such Discovery as aforesaid, payable upon the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.
