THE Count de Levolde, and M. Hoffman Resident of Russia, delivered Yesterday their Memorials to the King of Poland in behalf of Dissenters. The former insists for all the Dissenters in General, according to the Sense of the 4th Article of the Treaty of 1717, as his Polish Majesty explained it by his own Declaration; and he insists afterwards upon the particular Conventions between Russia and Poland, with respect to the Schismatick Greeks and Roman Catholicks who reside in their respective Dominions. Sir Luke Schaub and Mr. Woodward, the British Ministers, have delivered their Memorials upon the Subject of Dissenters, jointly with the Minister of Holland, to the King; who received them very graciously, assuring them, that he would cause an Answer to be given thereunto, the most favourable he could. The Turkish Ambassadour had Yesterday his Audience of Leave. The King of Poland's Departure for Saxony is fixed to the 3d of March; the Privy Councillor de Bunau is already set out; the Marquês de Fleury and M. Thioly will depart To-morrow; and the Foreign Ministers will follow his Majesty one after another for the Conveniency of Accommodations on the Road. The French Ambassadour alone will tarry here till after Easter.

Paris, March 14, N. S. The King, Queen, the Dauphin, and all the Royal Family, continue to enjoy perfect Health. Prince George of Hesse Cassel is expected

here about the Easter Holidays; and it is believed that he will enter into the French Service in Quality of Lieutenant General of the King's Armies. The Abbot Lanti has put off, till the 8th of next Month, his publick Entry into this City. Letters from Seville of the 22d of last Month advise, that the Count de Rottembourg continues to have frequent Audiences of the King and Queen of Spain, and that he is often in Conference with the Spanish Ministers.
