Copenhagen, April 7, N. S.

THE Queen of Denmark, who has been lately indisposed, is now so well recovered, that her Majesty ventured, the Beginning of this Week, to accompany the King to Friedensbourg. The White Ribbon was given on the Prince's Birth Day to Count Rantzau, as also to General Schmettau, and M. Sohlenthal Governour to the Prince. The two Battalions of the Regiment of Foot, and the Body of Artillery that are in Quarters in the flat Country, are forthwith expected here to pass in Review before his Majesty. On the 2d Instant the Magistrates met in the Town House lately rebuilt, for the first Time.

Berlin, April 7, N. S. On Wednesday last M. Cnyphausen, lately Minister of State, died at his Commandery, and the Count de Binck, General of the Foot, succeeds him therein. M. de Hanicke, Marshal of the Court of Brunswick, is arrived here, to notify to his Prussian Majesty the Death of the late Duke of Brunswick Lunenbourg.

Dresden, April 7, N. S. The Count de Truchses arrived here the 5th Instant from the Court of Berlin.
