Stockholm, July 7.

Dmiral Taube has been declared Prefident of the Admiralty of Carlfcroon, vacant fince the Beginning
of this Year by the Death of Baron
Wachtmeister. M. von Ungern is made Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment of Life-Guards, in the Room of Count Spens, who is made Colonel of the Wester Gothie Cavalry, which Baron Kruse resigned in his Favour by reason of his great Age, having, as it is said, been Aide de Camp to the Prince of Condé at the Battle of Senest. Two Secretaries of State, and all the Governours of Provinces who were not already, have been created Barons. The Court, which went into Mourning the 1st for the Death of the late Margrave Albert, left it off the 4th to celebrate St. Ulrica's Day, and the next; which was the Dutchess of Mecklenbourg's Birthday, when there was a Ball at Court. The Dutch Minister sets out to Morrow, attended by M. Duben, the Marshal's Son, who is declared Secretary of the Swedish Embassy at the Hague. The Danish Secretary Reisen, who has resided at this Court ten Years, had his Audience of Leave last Week in order to return Home. The

Queen of Sweden was present this Morning

in the Senate for the first Time.
