**T**HE States of the Province of Holland have consented to the Plan settled in the late Conferences relating to the Treaty of Vienna, and their Resolution is sent to the respective Provinces to hasten their Concurrence. The Prince of Nassau Orange is come hither, and will, 'tis said, remain here till the End of this Month. M. Till is propos'd by Holland to succeed as Resident M. Houwens who died lately at Lisbon; and 'tis likely he will be chosen.
