**T**HE British Squadron, commanded by Sir Charles Wager, which failed from hence the 6th Instant, having ever since had fair Weather and a favourable Wind, there is reason to hope they have already passed the Gulph of Lyons.

The Introduction of the Spanish Garrisons being now finish'd, the Grand Duke has returned his Thanks to the British Admiral, and Mr. Colman his Britannick Majesty's Minister, for the Part they have acted upon this Occasion; with which Count Charni, General of the King of Spain's Forces here, and the Marquess de Mari the Spanish Admiral, are equally pleased. Mr. Colman is set out for Florence; the Spanish Minister returned thither some Days before; and the Marquess Rinuccini, the Grand Duke's Minister, is likewise going back to Florence.

This Place enjoys perfect Tranquility, Count Charni taking Care to preserve an exact Military Discipline, by punishing rigorously the least Disorder among the Soldiers; so that the Merchants here are entirely easy with respect to the good Order that the Commerce requires: For the Advantage of which it is said, a shorter and better Road will be made from Tuscany into the Dutchy of Parma.

This being His Majesty's Birth-Day, the Great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Vollics from the Regiments on

Duty, which were drawn out upon Oxmantown Green. At Noon there was a more numerous and splended Appearance at the Castle than was ever seen in this Kingdom of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment his Grace the Lord Lieutenant, before whom an Ode set to Musick was performed in the Council Chamber. In the Evening a Play was given by his Grace for the Entertainment of the Ladies: And the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy. The Ball and Entertainment at the Castle, upon this Occasion, are deferred till Monday, as more convenient than Saturday, for that Purpose.
