## A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

**W**HEREAS Hugh Earl of Loudoun was duly elected and returned to be one of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to sit in the House of Peers of the present Parliament of Great Britain, and is since deceased; in order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his Room, We do, by the Advice of our Privy Council, issue forth this our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy-Rood House in Edinburgh, on Friday the Twenty Eighth Day of January next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and chuse another Peer of Scotland, to sit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of Great Britain, in the Room of the said Hugh Earl of Loudoun deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies for such as shall be absent, such Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly signed before Witnesses, and both the Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes; and immediately after such Election made and duly examined, to certify the Name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the same in Presence of the said Peers, and Return such Certificate into our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And we strictly charge and command that this our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twenty Five Days at the least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such Election.

Given at our Court at *St. James's*, the Ninth Day of *December* 1731, in the Fifth Year of our Reign.

On Wednesday last about Noon his most Serene Highness the Duke of Lorraine, who has resided here for some Time past by the Name of Count Blamont, having taken his Leave of their Majesties and all the Royal Family, went to Greenwich, accompanied by Count Kinsky, his Grace the Duke of Richmond, the Earl of Albemarle, and several others of the Nobility, where he dined with the Duke of Richmond, and about Five in the Afternoon his most Serene Highness embarked on board His Majesty's Yacht the Fubbs, which set sail immediately for Holland.

Whereas on Tuesday the 30th of November last, in the Night Time, between the Hours of Ten and Twelve, the Dwelling House of Thomas Page, Esq; at Battle-den, in the County of Bedford, was attempted to be broke open by Four Persons unknown; and on Friday the 3d Instant, between the Hours of Seven and Eight in the Evening, Samuel Lenton, a Servant of the said Mr. Page's, was fired at when he was in his Master's Brew-house adjoining to the said Dwelling House, through a Hole in the Wall, and was in Danger of being killed, the Bullet taking off two Buttons from his Waistcoat; which Attempt upon the said Samuel Lenton was supposed to have been made by one of the Four Persons above-mentioned, in Revenge for his having discharged a Blunderbuss from the Window of the House at the Time that it was endeavoured to be broken open, as aforesaid, and thereby wounded, as he imagined, one or more of the said Four Persons: His Majesty, for the better deterring of the Persons concerned in such villanous and wicked Actions, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon, to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, (except the Person who fired at the said Samuel Lenton) so as they, or any of them, be apprehended and convicted thereof.
