This Day His Majesty was pleased to fill up Four of the vacant Stalls at Westminster, of the most Honourable Order of the Bath, by conferring the Honour of Knighthood of that Order on the Lord Marquess of Carnarvon, Lord Viscount Bateman, Sir George Downing Baronet, and Charles Gunter Nicol, Esq;. The Ceremony was performed by His Majesty in His Closet; his Royal Highness

the Prince of Wales, his Royal Highness the Duke, the Grand Master, with several of the Great Officers of the Court attending.

The Sovereign having put on the Ribbon, with the Badge of the Order hanging to it, Bath King of Arms, carrying on a Cushion the Ribbon with the Badge of the Order hanging to it, introduced the Marquess of Carnarvon, who kneeling before the Sovereign, was Knighted with the Sword of State.
