**T**HE Duke of Lorrain having passed some Days at Blankenbourg with their Highnesses the Duke and Dutcheſs of Brunſwick Wolfenbuttel, is expected here this Day with the whole Court, and great Preparations are making for the Reception of this Prince. The Count of Buckebourg arrived here Yeſterday, and the Prince of Waldeck is expected here this Day: All the Nobility of the neighbouring Country are come hither with magnificent Equipages to partake of the Diversions deſigned for the Duke of Lorrain. Our Fair begins next Monday.

*Berlin, Feb. 5, N. S.* Preparations are making for the Reception of the Duke of Lorrain, who is expected here about the 16th Instant. The Duke and Dutcheſs of Bevern, the Hereditary Prince their Son, and the Princesses their eldeſt Daughter, are likewiſe expected here about the ſame Time. They talk here of three Encampments to be formed next Summer on the Frontiers of Poland.

Whereas Sir Philip Yorke, Kt. His Majesty's Attorney General, received on Friday laſt, by the Penny Poſt, a Letter dated January 26, 1731, ſigned A. B. C. and directed to Sir Phillip York, at his Chambers in the Temple, deſiring him to pleaſe Three Hundred Guineas in a particular Manner and Place therein deſcribed, on the next Day, between the Hours of Nine and Twelve at Night, and threatning, that in Caſe of Failure his Houſe ſhould be in Flames within 24 Hours after, and that he himſelf ſhould not long ſurvive it: His Majesty, for the better diſcovering and bringing to Juſtice the Perſons concerned in ſo heinous a Crime, is pleaſed to promiſe His moſt gracious Pardon to any one of them who ſhall diſcover his Accomplice or Accomplices, ſo as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is alſo pleaſed to promiſe a Reward of Five Hundred Pounds

to any one of them, or to any other Perſon or Perſons who ſhall make ſuch Diſcovery as aforeſaid, to be paid on the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders.
