Berlin, March 11, N. S.

Yesterday at Six a-Clock in the Evening the Espousals of the Prince Royal of Prussia and the Princess of Beveren, were solemnized at the Castle, in presence of a very numerous Court. M. Marshall de Biberstein, the King of Prussia's Minister to the King of Poland, came hither a few Days ago from Dresden, in order, as it is said, to receive new Instructions before he follows his Polish Majesty into Poland.

Berlin, March 15, N. S. This Morning at Eleven a-Clock, the Duke of Lorraine left this Place. He lies this Night at Dalwitz, a House belonging to M. Marshall, about three German Miles off; and To-morrow he goes to Francfort, and from thence to Breslau. The King of Prussia has been laid up with a Fit of the Gout ever since Monday last, so that he was not able to accompany the Duke of Lorraine, as he intended.

Dublin, March 4.

Wednesday last being Her Majesty's Birthday, it was celebrated with great Splendour and Rejoycings. In the Evening, after a Play given by his Grace for the Entertainment of the Ladies, there was a Ball and Entertainment at the Castle, in Rooms fitted up for that Purpose, with the utmost Magnificence, with Paintings and great Variety of Decorations. This Day his Grace went to the University, and heard several Orations and Verses in Latin and English, in Honour of Her Majesty, spoken by the Authors, whose Performances entitled them to the Reward of an Hundred Pounds, given by his Grace to be distributed among them on that Occasion.

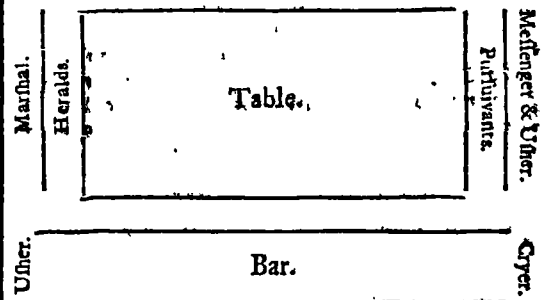

The Duke of Norfolk's Patent from King Charles the Second was then read, with the Deputation by his Grace to Francis Earl of Effingham.

His Majesty's Approbation followed.

Then the Lord Marshal took the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy, with the Oath of Office, tendered to him by Dr. Henschman.

After that Dr. Henschman's Appointment to be Advocate to the Court.

The Commissions of the Lord Marshal's Register and Proctor were severally read and confirmed, and they took the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy, with the Oath of Office.

Several Doctors, with other Proctors, were named and approved by the Earl Marshal.

Then the King's Advocate moved a Cause, and adjourned to the 30th of this Instant March.
