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Leghorn, Aug. 15.

He Corlairs of *Tunis* have been of late very bufie upon thefe Coafts, and we hear already of fome Ships taken by them; We have juft now advice, of their having landed near *Gorgans*, where they burnt and defiroyed feveral Houles, together with the Magazines there, and did other confiderable mifchief the people having field up into the Countrey, and by that means elcaped being made Slaves.

Warfim, Aug. 16. From the Ukrain our Letters bring us this unwelcome news, that the Rebel Col-facks having with the affiftance of the Tartars, gotten together what ftrength they could, had fallen upon our Troops in thole parts, and after a hot dispute on both files, worsted them ; the farther particulars of this action we as yet want, but in the mean time it is feared, this success may very much encou-rage the Rebel-Collacks, and so occasion newtroubels in that Countrey. Neither are we at the fame time lefs concerned at the news we have of the advance of part of the Turkila Forces, and of their having belieged *Caminiec* in *Podolia*, which being not fo well provided with Men and o.her necessaries, as the prefervation of the place may require, it is feared will quickly fall into their hands : however, allpreparations are making against the 25 instant, for the general Rendezvous of the Nobility at Sakal in Fulhinia; the Nobility of leveral of the Palatinares are already on their march, fo that the King will part hence in a day or two on his journey thither. We are told of Ambassadors that are on their way hither from Muscowy, and that their errand is to propole a League between the Czar and this Crown for their mutual defence against the Ottoman Power, which if so, will certainly be readily accepted here ; fince the affistance of our neighbors cannot

but be very leasonable to us in this conjuncture. Ratisbonne, Aug. 18. The Treaty for the publick fecurity of the Empire, having at length after the many difficulties that arole thereupon, been concluded by the leveral Colledges, and accordingly approved by the Emperor, the Dyet have fince proceeded to the fetling of leveral other matters relating to the faid Treaty; however, the point concerning Martial Law is still in debate, the feveral Deputies baying defired time to fend to confult their respective Principals therein, before it be finally concluded. From Lipfick they write, that the Circle of Hpper Saxony which had been Affembled there, had refolved to furnish forthwith the Troops, the faid Treaty obliges them to, provided the reft of the Circles would with the fame readiness do their part; fo that we may in a short time, in case there should be occasion, feethis Army on foot : the Prince of Biden Dourlach, Velt Marshal General of the Empire, and who under that Title is to Command these Forces in chief, together with the other general Officers, are fud-dainly expected here, in order to their taking the O this of Fidelity before the Dver. The Bishop of Aichfadt the Emperors Com sillioner, having been or some time to divert himself in the Country, is

in few days likewife expected here in Town, when it is thought, the other matters now in debate before the Dyet, may be also determined. The Elector of *Bavaria* we hear, railes Men apace, as well in order to the reinforcement of his own Garrisons, as the fending, as is faid, fome fuccors to the Duke of Savoy. The Imperial Troops are now infew days expected at *Frankfort*, from whence they are to pafs down the *Rbyne*, in feveral open Boats provided there to that purpole.

Gensua, Aug, 24. The 20 inftant arrived here a a Courier in fix days from Paris, difpatched thence by the Envoy of this State refiding there, bringing advice, that his most Christian Majesty was lending the Sieur Gaumont into these parts, to mediate a Peace between us and the Duke of Sawoy. In the mean time th F of this State are gone as is faid, to attack P is be wn Nizza and T rin, to hinder by ha me ns the Commun c 10^m f thole plces, he ng already made h mf ers of the whole Te t yo gla.

nole Te t yo gla. Liege, Aug. 30. Thisday the F nch Arm which hath for some time been encamped near Maestricht, broke up from thence, and took their ma c towards the Rhyne, under the Command of the Marquis de Rochfort, to observe, as we are told, the motions of the German Forces, who are now on their march; yefterday arrived in the French Camp from Sedan feveral Waggons laden with Money, under the Convoy of 1600 Horle, for the payment of those Troops; in the mean time we hear, that Monfieur Turenne lies incamped with 15000 Horfe and 20000 Foot, not far from Welel. Some days fince passed through this place the young Electoral Prince Palatine, on his way to Heydelberg, having been most of this Summer in the French Camp. From Postdam they write, that the 24 instant his Electoral Highness of Brandenbarg, intended to part thence with his whole Court to Halberstadt, where the Conjunction is to be of the Imperial Troops, with thole of his Electoral Highnels ; That the Sieur Pelnist, and the Heer d'Amerongen were 'arrived there from Hokand. From Dreiden they tell us, that the 12 Imperial Regiments were palfed by that place, on their march towards the Rhyne.

Cologne, Aug. 30. Our Magistrates have received Letters from his Imperial Majesty, giving them notice, That his Borčes were ready to begin their march towards these parts, for the better security of the peace of the Empire; and fince we have advice, that these Troops are arrived under the Command of General Montecueuli, and Prince Charles of Lorrain, as General of the Horle, at Laemburgh, not far from Nurenburgh; and that preparations are making at Franckfors, for the bringing the faid Iroops from thence down the Rbyn; in the interim the French come likewise marching towards these parts, and post themselves in very confiderable Bodies near Orfoy, Rbynberg, and Wessi, it is reported here, that the Elector of Brandenburgh will act 2part with his Army, to confist of 30000 Men, against the Jifnog of Munster.
