Officers of his Majesty's Houshold, went from Herrenhausen to Celle, where his Majesty intends this Afternoon to view his Stables, and To-morrow to hunt and shoot several wild Beasts, which have, by Order, been driven into Toils near that Place for his Majesty's Diversion: On Thursday and Friday will be the Review of several Regiments of Horse and Foot, which are drawn together in that Neighbourhood, and on Saturday the King will go from thence to Gohrde, where he designs to stay till the Saturday following, the 6th of September, N.S. on which Day his Majesty proposes to return to Hanover.
