Whitehall, July 21, 1732.

And whereas another Letter, dated the 11th of July, 1732, and signed T. M. was delivered to the said Mr. Fairchild's Servant by a Boy unknown, containing the same threatening Expressions, and repeating the same Demand: Her Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in so heinous a Crime, is pleased to promise His Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any one or two of them, who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
