Efterday the Czarina fet out from Peterhoff for Crofnagurk, which is about 30 Miles from nence, where Tents are pitched for her Majeffy to pass the Night in; and this Morning the is to see, from the Shore, her Heet, commanded by Admiral Gordon, who is to exercise the Seamen in representing a Sea-Fight; after which her Majeffy's to return the same Day to Peterhoff, from whence it is thought the Court will come back next Week to this City.

Warfaw, Aug. 16. Several of the Leffer Diets of Great and Little Poland are broke up without chufing Deputies to the General Diet. That of Czerko was very tumultuous, two Men were killed, and between 30 and 40 wounded. We have not yet had Accounts how they have fucceeded in Lithuania or Polifh Pruffia.

Warfaw, Aug. 23. The King of Po-land is expected in Town To morrow, Yefterday all the General Officers and Colonels had the Honour of dining with him, and he proposed reviewing To-day the Polish Infantry Man by Man, and to chule 100 out of each Regiment to remain here as a Guard for his Perfon. They are now encamped clofe by his Majesty's Quarters, but the Horse are at fome Diftance, and within a Day or two will have Orders to march to their Winter Quarters. Since the Poles in feveral of their Dietines have shewn great Diffatisfaction at so many Saxon Troops being here, beyond the first Number of 1200, which has been exceeded during the Camp by about 700, his Majefty is refolved to remove all Pretence of Complaint of that Nature in the approaching General Diet ; therefore he has ordered all his Saxon Troops to return home, viz. two Regiments of Horfe, commanded by the Prince of Saxe Gotha, and Colonel Naffau, and a Regiment

of Foot commanded by Count Frife, and they are to take different Routes, but their March will be very flow, having 36 Days allowed them from hence to the Frontiers.

them from hence to the Frontiers. Warface, Aug. 23. The Departure of the Saxon Troops, which are to return home, is put off for a few Days; and his Polifh Majefty has told the Imperial Amballadour, that he would fend him a Letter for the Emperour, defiring leave for their free Pallage through a Part of Silefia. His Majefty came to Town the 21it, after having chofen about 300 Men to remain here for his Guard, out of the Polith Regiments.

Seville, Aug. 19. The Count de Montemar, who commanded in thief the Spanish Forces employed in the Conquest of Oran, returned hither the 13th Instant, and had Audience the next Day of their Catholick Majesties, who received him very graciously. A strong Garrison has been put into that Place, and the rest of the Troops are sent home in three Divisions, one of which landed at Alicant the 5th Instant, another at Malaga the 7th, and there is no Doubt but the third Division, which was sent back to Barcelona, is arrived there before this Time. By our last Advices from Ceuta, a Body of about 5000 Moors was encamped at a small Distance from that Place.

Mr. Keene, his Britannick Majefty's Minifter Plenipotentiary at this Court, having complained of fome Difficulties which the Garrifon of Gibraltar met with in being fupplied with Provifions from the neighbouring Coafts of Spain, his Catholick Majefty has thereupon been pleafed to give the following Order to the Governours of the Coafts of Andalufia, Granada and Murcia.

"It being the King's Fleafure that the "Town of Gibraltar be allowed to import "whatever Victuals and Provisions may be "wanted for the Garrison, provided it be "done
