Warsaw, February 7, N. S.

THE Primate, as now Head of this Republick, has sent his Marshal to notify the Death of the King of Poland to the Foreign Ministers. The Dyet of Convocation is appointed for the 27th of April, and the Dietines for electing of Deputies about the Middle of March; for which Purpose Universals will be forthwith issued out. All Tribunals cease upon the Demise of the crowned Head, except within the Grand Marshal's Jurisdiction (which does not extend far from the Capital) till the Dietines, by which Courts of Justice are to be appointed in every Palatinate, but only for Criminal Cases. Ministers are to be sent to several Courts to notify the Death of his Polish Majesty; and to others, the Letters of Notification will be recommended to Foreign Ministers here. When the Body of the King of Poland was opened to be embalmed, it could not be perceived that he died of a Mortification, as was imagined, the Bowels and all the Inside appearing sound.
