COUNT Sinzendorff delivered Yesterday a Memorial to the States, containing two Heads; the first to acquaint them, that upon the Emperor's Instances the King of Prussia had released the Dutch Soldiers who were Prisoners. The other, that his Imperial Majesty hoped the States will on their Part make some Steps towards a perfect Reconciliation. The Memorial is referred to some Deputies, and it is said that there will be a Conference within two or three Days between Count Sinzendorff and those Deputies upon that Matter. Yesterday the Pensionary, in a Conference with the States General, pressed the Deputies of the respective Provinces to satisfy their respective Quotas to the present Establishment of Troops, as a Means and Encouragement to the States of Holland to defer the Reduction of the said Troops for a Year longer, as it is intended to be proposed to the Assembly this session, which will begin Tomorrow. The Prince of Orange was to set out Yesterday from Leeward to return hither, and is daily expected. Baron d'Utterfium, formerly a Deputy from Overysfel to the States General, is dead in his Province, whither he went some Weeks ago. The Deputies of the States of Holland disposed Yesterday of all the Military Subaltern Employments vacant, which were pretty numerous.
