That the Places for performing Quarantine by such Ships and Vellels bound to the Rivers of Thames and Medway, be Standgate-Creek on the South Shore of the River Medway, opposite to the Isle of Grain, Sharp-fleet Creek, and the lower End of the Hope; and by fuch Ships and Vessels coming into any other of the Ports of Great Britain, be such Places as shall be appointed by the Officers of His Majesty's Customs in such Ports,

That the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War, as likewise the Commanders of His Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying thear the Sea Coast, be aiding and affishing to the said Officers of His Majesty's Customs, in stopping all such Ships as aforesaid, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for Performance of their Quarantine, and in the due Performance thereof: And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great-Britain, the Master General and the rest of the Principal Ossicers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
