Tunes, Aug. 28. Out fix Biserta Gallies are re-turned into Port, having brought with them 85 Slaves, most taken from the Christian Shoar, in their return home, they were met by seven Maltha Gallies, who gave close chase to them for the space of 24 hours, but our Gallies our rowed them by much. The Sieur Martal Commanding a Squadron of fix French men of War in thele feas, having concluded a peace as well here as at Argiers, hath fince been before Tripoli on the same account, though we cannot as yet hear that he hath concluded

any thing there.

Ditto, sept 12. The Sieur Martel arrived with his Squadron lately in this Port, and after having continued here some days to take in Provision's and

other refuelhments, went out again to cruite. Lishonne, Octob. 1. We are fitting out here eight confiderable Ships to be sent to the Indies the next Spring From Brazile we have advice, that the St. Pedron Vice-Admiral of our East-India Fleet, which went hence this year, being as far as the Cape of Good Hope, was forced by a mutiny of the Search and Soldiers, who cut down her Mass, to bear up with light lists fail as they could make for Realth. with luch little fail as they could make for Brazile; Orders have been sent from hence to fit her out again with all speed. We hear of a Hurricane that bath lately happened in the Province of Alentejo, which hath destroyed most of their Oyl and Wine, thrown down abundance of Houses, and killed a great many people, insomuch that the loss is valued at three Milions of Crowns,

Rome, Octob. 1. On the 18 instant the famous Sieup Borri, Native of Milan, who for having published and afferted leveral damnable and Heretical Tencts in niatters of Religion, was about two years fince apprehended in Germany by the Emperors direction, and sent prisoner hither, in order to his being proceeded against by the Inquisition here, made a solemn Abiaration of all his Herefies in the Church of Minerus, in the presence of the whole Colledge of Cardinals, most of the Nobility and persons of quality about Town, and an extraor-dinary, concourse of people; after which he was reaconducted to preson, where according to the Sentence of the said Inquision, he is to remain for eyer and to recite every day the Creed, every week the Eleven Penetential Plalms, and to Confess and Communicate every month; the Inquisition referving however to themselves a power to alter this Sentence hereafter, as they hall find fir,

Warfam, Ostob. 11. Hand, who, it is computed, may confift of 30000 Ere is arrived the Nightingal Frigat with Men more; with this Army, if in the mean time our Commissioners shall not be able to obtain peace, the King will march to attacke the Enemy in the ukrain, if not ere that, advanced nearer to us, as it, may well be feared he will, confidering the little opposition he can as yet any where meet with; a very considerable Body of Tartars and Cossacks have been certainly before Leopol, and demanded the place to be furfendred to them, and as certain it is, that the Governor had upon their first Summons, absolutely refused to hear of any such proposals, being resolved to defend the Town to the last extremity; but we not having now had any Letters from thence for thele five or fix days, are in great expectation to know what may have fince happened, very much apprehending, that if the Enemy continues to straiten the place, they within will not be able to defend themselves long, through the great want they are in of all kind of Provisions: The 7 instassit arrived in the Army the Auxiliary Troops of the Elector of Brandenburgh, being in all bur 1000 Men, though according to the late Treary, that Elector is to furnish 6000 Men; several pieces of Cannon have some days since been sent from hence to the Army, with other Military Provisions, fo that we now seem to endeavor in earnest, to pur our selves into a posture of desence, which we might hope to do, could we once overcome those many factions that so miserably divide this King-

Madrid, Odob. 12. The Venetian Ambassador parted hence the last week on his return home, having left the Secretary of the Embassy to reside The Marquis de Liche is pretty well recovered of his late indisposition From Alicant we are told of the 27 past, that the day before passed by there five Galleys of the Duke of Tursi's Squadron for Cartagena, under the Command of Don Pagano Dorja, in order to their transporting thence the new

The Sieur de Gaumont the French Envoy, having fome days fince received by an Exprels, farther directions from the Court of France, concerning his Negotiation here, which as is said, were, That unless he received a satisfactory answer from the Senate to his late Propolals, within 24 hours after the receipt of these Orders, he should immediately return home, the faid Envoy acquainted the Senate therewith, who accordingly resolved not to be wanting on their part, in any thing that might conduce to an accommodation, and that they would accept of the conditions propoled by the faid Envoy, in order thereunto. In the mean time we hear, that the Duke of Savoys Forces have lately taken one of two places more on the Frontiers, belong-

ing to this State.

Dantzick, Offob. 14. Our Letters from Poland and Kullanda making up in all, together with those tell us,, of great confusion that was in the Army, Troops which were already with the King, 30000 the generality of the Nobility continuing to urge the Mon, it is faid his Majethy liftends to march direct. If for Lublin, and there expect the arrival of the in order to their proceeding against those, who have hitherto fo infolehtly and maliciously frustrated all, the good intentions of the King for the publick good; and in the hest place, that the Aichbishop of Guesna, the Crown General Sobietski, and the Crown Treafurer Bonski, as the chief Abettors of all these Factions, should be displaced, and others appointed in those high Offices; They farther add, that in this fury they would have apprehended the Chaltellan of Poina, and the Crown Standart Bearer, with leveral others, had they not privately retired themselves what troubles these jealousies and disorders among the Nobility may involve the Kingdon into, we feat we shall too foon he ir, especially considering how for midable an Enemy is at their doors, and how un-fetled their affairs at home still are; The Envoy that was lent to the Imperial Court is returned, not much to the satisfaction of the Poles, the conditions on which the Emperor proposes to assist them, being so hard, that it is (aid, they will rather want the one, then confent to the other; We have advice, that the Crown General being joyned with Hanenko, General of the Coffacks, had fallen unawares upon a confiderable Body of Tartars, and totally routed them, which may prove of great advantage to the Poles in the present Conjuncture; We are told that the Irhabitants of Leopol have compounded with the Tarta'ts for 80 thousand Gilders, to quit the place.

Hambraugh, Octob. 23. From Sweden we are told, that the States of that Kingdom assemble daily, and are advancing with great unanimity to the conclusion of several matters of much importance; they farther speak of several thousand Menthat Crown is about transporting into Pomeren and their other Territories, in Germany. Our Letters from Poland say, that the Turks having made themselves masters of Leopoly, were advanced towards Cracow, and that it was seared, that place would likewise fall into their hands, before it could possibly be relieved by the Poles; but this news we hope will be contradicted by our next Letters.

Cologne, Off. 23. By a Vessel which came down the Rhyn, and arrived here two days fince, we have advice; that the Auxiliary Troops were marching towards the Rhyn, and that the Van of the Army, confissing in 9200 Men, was already arrived over against Menty; it is discoursed here, that the French Army will remove out of the County of Bergh into that of Qulick. From Heydelbergh of the 15 in. stant, we are told, that some days before arrived there on the part of the Emperor, Prince Harman, Marquis of Baden, to invite that Elector to enter into the League concluded between his Imperial Majesty, the Elector of Brandenburgh, &c. but that he made no long stay there, having, as is laid, received this Answer from the Elector, That as he would be always ready to contribute his utmost power for the conserva ion of the peace of the Empire, so he defired to be excused from entring into any other Interefts.

Brussels Ostob. 25. On Thursday last Don Emaniel de Lyra, the Spanish Minister, went hence for the Hagne, after having had several conferences with his Exc. llency the Count de Monterey, but the Baron d'Issola, is still here; the Duke of Bournonville may now very suddainly part hence on his way to the Imperial Army, which we are told he is to Compand in quality of Lieutenant-General, the Count de Montecuculi being remanded home by his Imperial Mijsty as well in consideration of his great age, as that the Emperor seems to have more pressing occasion for his service nearer home; We are told of 3000 French that are some days since arrived bt Charleroy from Maserck, and that they are to con-

tique their march from thence towards Lorrain; according to our lait-advices from Germany, the confederate Armies were then quartered between Franck fore and Mentz; being very much at a stand, by reason of the Electors of Mentz and of Treves, having absolutely refused them passage over the Rhyne. The French Army continues as yet in the County of Bergh, though it is reported that they intend to march towards Gulickerland for Forage.

Hague, Ostob. 28, The 25 instant arrived here an Express from the Elector of Brandenburgh, with advice, that his Electoral Highness had his head quarter at Gotsbach, and intended to march thence towards the Rhyn; That in the mean time he had written to the Bishop of Munster, in the name of his Imperial Majesty, to press him to declare Categorically, whether he be still resolved to adhere to the Interests of France in this present War, that they might know how to proceed accordingly; The Prince of Orange is expected here, in order to the concluding some Maritime affairs, about which as well Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter, as the Feputi the Respective Admiralties, have been for f v al days here in Town, and had several Conferences with the Councel of State; The Count Conningsmark is made General of the Infantry, in the room of the late Monsieur Zulefleyn. Here is arrived the Heer Crakaum, on his way to England, whither he goes as Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburgh : Vice-Admiral van Nesse is ordered to go to Sea, with ten men of War, as well to convoy our Marchant men as to annoy the Enemy.

Ditto, Octob. 28. Here is much discourse of the design said to be now in hand, which however is kept so secret, that sew people can say any thing of, it; The Prince of Orange is in the mean time bringing all his Forces together from all parts, and has appointed their general Rendezvous to be at the Old Bosch, about five Leagues from Willem-stadt, whither for their greater case, they are carried in state bottom Boats, which are to sye ready there to transport them on the suddain to that place, which they intend to attack. It is said the Army will consist of near 30000 Men.

Paris, Offob. 29. About the middle of the next week their Majesties remove with the Court from St. Germains to Versailles, the young Duke d'Anjou being persectly recovered of his late indispositions. Yesterday the Prince of Conde went hence for Meta, and within few days Monsieur de Navailles will part hence towards Assail, it a, by order of his Majesty, to see in what posture things are there. Since our last we have the farther particulars of the late Action of Woodden, which in the whole lets us more plainly see the great advantage we then obtained over the Dutch, notwithstanding the inequality of their number, they being counted in all near 12000 Men, when ours were not more then 2500.

Hull, Octob. 21. We have advice here, that yesterday Morning the Portsmouth Frigat gave thase to a Dutch Privateer of 20 Guns off of Humber, and we are informed by another Vessel, come in since from Sea, that the said Frigat was got within Canon shot of the said Privateer, and must in all probability have taken her.
