MR. Secretary Cary informed the House of Commons the 27th inst, that he was commanded by his Grace the Lord Lieutenant to acquaint the House, that His Majesty had been pleased to return the following most gracious Answer to the Address of that House.

HIS Majesty accepts most graciously the Address of the House of Commons, and the Professions contained in it of their Duty and Loyalty, and looks upon the Satisfaction they express upon the Occasion of the intended Marriage between the Princess Royal and the Prince of Orange, as a Mark of their Zeal and Affection for His Majesty's Person and Royal Family. And as they may always depend upon his Favour and Protection, His Majesty is persuaded they will continue to deserve it, by the Cheerfulness and Unanimity with which they will apply themselves to support his Government, and to promote His Service, and the Welfare of their Country.

The House attended his Grace the Lord Lieutenant Yesterday at the Castle with this Address of Thanks to His Majesty.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Knights, Citizens and Burgeesses in Parliament assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Ireland in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to return our humble Thanks for your Majesty's most gracious Answer to our Address.

Your Majesty's favourable Acceptance of the Satisfaction expressed by us on the Occasion of the intended Marriage between the Princess Royal and the Prince of Orange, gives the utmost Pleasure to a People, who have born a Part in suffering for the Protestant Cause; too calamitous to be forgotten. And whose Share in restoring it will ever be esteemed the Glory of this Kingdom.

The Confidence your Majesty places in our Fidelity and Affections, leaves us no Room to doubt, that we have been faithfully represented to your Majesty; and will farther engage and encourage us to persevere in supporting your Majesty's Government; and in making the most grateful Returns for the peaceable Enjoyment of all that is valuable to Mankind, under your Majesty's indulgent and auspicious Reign.

Whereupon his Grace was pleased to return the Answer following.

I shall take immediate Care to transmit this loyal and dutiful Address, in order to be laid before His Majesty.

Whitehall, November 13.
