Leghorn, November 30.

ON the 22d Instant arrived here from Alicant four Spanish Men of War and 13 Transports, having on board nine Battallions: Since which arrived four Transports from Barcelona, from whence they came the 22d, and on the Way parted with 70 other Transports, having on board 2000 Horse. These Ships are to be followed by a Fleet with the rest of the Spanish Army, consisting of 20000 Men.

Brussels, Dec. 14. Yesterday being the Anniversary of her most Serene Highness the Archdutchess's Birth Day, when she entered into the 53d Year of her Age, her Highness received on that Occasion the Compliments of all the Lords and Ladies of the Court. M. Walsner, who was charged with the Affairs of the Emperor at the Court of France, arrived here last Thursday from Paris.
