Hague, April 30. We have confirmed Advices from Italy, that the City of Naples has submitted to the Arms of the King of Spain, and that the Keys of the said City were presented to the Infant Don Carlos, who had caused Capua and Gaeta to be invested, and detached Four thousand Men to pursue the Vice-Roy, who had retired towards Manfredonia

donia with Two thousand Men. Letters from Dantzick relate, that that City being closely besieged by the Muscovites, the Magistrates had sent a Deputation to King Stanislaus, representing to him, that if Succours did not arrive before the 1st of May, they must indispensably take such Measures as might prevent the City from being entirely ruined; whereupon M. de Monti, the French Minister, gave Assurances of the Succours being actually failed.

Yesterday between Seven and Eight in the Morning, her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange, and his most Serene Highness the Prince her Consort, left St James's, and went over in the Royal Barges from Whitehall to Lambeth, where the King's Coaches, with a Party of the Horse-Guards, attended to receive them and their Retinue, and to carry and escort them to Gravesend, in order to their Highnesses embarking on board the Royal Yachts for Holland.

The same Morning her Royal Highness the Princess Amelia set out from St. James's for the Bath.
