it is faid, the Elector of Branlenburgh hath by a ! Trumpeter written to Monsieur de Turenne, who we hear lies encamped with his Army not far from Coblent?.

Liege, Novemb. 15. This Chapter hath at lengt resolved to raise several Troops for the better desence of their Countrey in the present Conjuncture; yesterday they Deputed two of their Body, to go and wait upon the Prince of Orange, who we hear, is arrived at Maestricht. The French hold themselves well at Maserik, and their other Posts in these parts, and feem not at all allaimed at the approach of the Dutch Forces, farther, then to put themselves into

a good posture of desence.
Cologne, Novemb. 15. We expect here with greattest impatience imaginable, to hear which way the Imperial and Brandenburgh Troops do take their march; some report, that having passed the Rhyn, they will come down directly towards these parts; though others will needs have them designed for Lorraine and Alfatia, to give the French a diversion that way. Monsieur de Turenne has passed the Rhyn with part of his Army, and hath as we are told, caufed an other Bildg to be made at Andernack to pals there with the rest of his Forces, as he sha'l see occasion, The Marelchals crequi and d'Humieres have been in the French Army, to confer with Monficur de Turenne, which having done, they are returned again to the Prince of Conde at Metz, who we hear is coming with a Body of 20000 Men from thence towards Sarbruck; The Duke de Burnonville is arrived in the Imperial Army, which it is said, he is to Command as Lieutenant General , the supreme direction thereof, having by his Imperial Majesty been conferred on the Bleftor of Brandenburgh , lo that General Montecuculi may now be about returning to Vienna, Signior Banvill, Nuncio here from the Pope, is going hence in that quality for Poland, to endeavor by his Holines Authority, to compose the many Factions and Jealousies, which have so long distracted that Kingdom.

Ditto, We have just now advice here, that the Confederate Armies will to morrow pass the Rhyn at Weylenack, over the Bridg of Boats by them made there; though at the same time our Letters from 'Ment? make not any mention hereof, but fay, that the Elector of Brandenburgh had his head quarters at Ruffetheym, a League from that place, and that indeed they were about making a Bridg over the Rhyn, which it was thought could not be so suddainly

Bruffels, Nov. 19. Some days fince arrived here the young Rhingrave Governor of Breda, on the part of the Prince of Orange, to demand of our Governor passage for his Army through the Spanish Territories, to march towards the Countrey of Liege; to which it is faid, his Excellency replyed, he could not do Without express Orders from the Court at Madrid; however the Prince of Orange not taking it feems much notice of this answer, hath taken his march through part of our Territories to-wards. Liege, and is advanced with his Troops within a League of Maestricht. His Excellency being informed that several Dutch parties have taken the liberty to pass through these Dominions to the Brench Conquests, to plunder the poor Countrey people there, and so return again, hath some days since caused a Placaet to be published, very severely forbidding all Durch Officers and Soldiers to pals through any of the Spanish Territories on the

like ordafion for the future.

Hague, Nop. 18. The Af instant the States of Holland and West Frielland met again for the first

time, it is faid they then made some resolution concerning the paying of the Militia, and the forming a new state of Var for the ensuing year. The Baron d'alfota is retugned hither again from Bruffels. The Prince of Orange being marched into the Countrey of Liege, hath left Count Coningsmark, General of the Infantry, to Command those Troops which remain in his Quarter at Bodegrave; the Count of Horne Commands at Oudemater, and the Velt Marshal Wurry at Gorcum. We are told that Count Coningsmark having been out with some Troops, and advancing too near the French Quarters at Woorden, ran great danger of falling into their hands, but that having had timely notice of the French being coming upon him, he immediately retired, and by that means escaped. The 14 instant being the Prince of Oranges Birth-day, on which he entred into the 22 year of his age, the States deputed

two of their Assembly to go and Compliment the Duchess Dowager upon that subject.

Paris, Nov. 19. The 11 Instant the Popes Nuncio, as likewise the Ambassadors and other foreign Ministers residing them, on the occasion of their Majesties, to Condole with them, on the occasion of the death of the young Duke d'Anjay; and the 14 his Excellency the Earl of Sunderland, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, had his first publick Audience of their Majesties at Versailles, having been Conducted to it, by the Prince of Lilebonne, and the Sieur de Bonnient Introductor of Ambassadors, with the usual Ceremonies We have advice, that the Prince of Conde brigh, with intentions to go and meet the Elector of Branden-brigh, which intentions to go and meet the Elector of Branden-brigh, who it is faid will pass the Rhyn with his Forces, and come down that way. It is said his Majesty intends to remove very suddainly, with the whole Court to Mass.
