The humble Addreſs of the Grand Jury of the City and County of the City of Corke, at an Aſſizes held for the ſaid City and County, April 13, 1734.

May it pleaſe your Maſteſty,

WE your Maſteſty's moſt dutiful and loyal Subjects, humbly beg Leave, with the profoundeſt Submiſſion, and Hearts overflowing with Joy, to congratulate your Maſteſty upon the happy Nuptials lately ſolemnized between her Royal Highneſs the Princeſs Roy 1, and his moſt Serene Highneſs the Prince of Orange ; and we intreat your Maſteſty to be aſſured, that we cannot but take to our ſelves the higheſt Satisfaction upon this uſeful Occaſion, whoſe Fathers and our ſelves as well as the reſt of the Proteſtants of your Maſteſty's Kingdom) were, under the Divine Providence, relieved and reſtored to our Religion, our Liberties, and every thing that was near and dear to us, by that renowned and illuſtrious Predeceſſor of your moſt Serene Highneſs, the late King William, of glorious Memory ; at a Time when our Enemies had encompassed us round, and well nigh devoured us.— And we moſt humbly aſſure your Maſteſty, that our conſtant Supplications to the Almighty King of Kings, are, and ſhall be, to preſerve your Maſteſty in all Proſperity long, many and many Years, to rule over us, and your Kingdoms ; that your Maſteſty may always gain the Victory over all your Enemies, be bleſſ'd in a numerous Poſterity ; and that we and our lateſt Deſcendants may never want one of your moſt Royal and Illuſtrious Blood to ſway the Scepter of your Dominions.

Moſt gracious Sovereign,

WE your Maſteſty's moſt dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Sovereign, Burgeſſes, Grand Jury, and Freemen of this your ancient and loyal Corporation of Kinſale, being aſſembled at our Court of Deer Hundred, on this joyful Day of your Maſteſty's Coronation, beg leave to approach your moſt ſacred Maſteſty, with Hearts full of Gratitude, for the many Bleſſings we have enjoy'd under your moſt auſpicious Government ; and on this Occaſion muſt teſtify our joyful Acknowledgements for the near Proſpect of a glorious and happy Peace, pro-

Vienna, May 26, N. S. By Letters from the Rhine we have adviſe, that Prince Eugene was at Hailbron on the 17th, and ſeem'd reſolv'd to ſtay there ; that he had received 4000 Men of thoſe who were diſperſed about the Black Foreſt, and that old General Wallis had alſo joined him with 7000.

Hague, June 8, N. S. Letters from the Ruſſian Camp before Dantzick, dated the 29th of May, bring an Account, that the French Succours which landed at Wechſelmunde on the 23d, endeavouring to force the Ruſſian Intrenchments along the Nering, had been twice repulſed with great Loſs, and were retired under the Cannon of Wechſelmunde, their Commander in Chief being killed in the Action. According to the Advices received here from Italy, the Imperial Army was march'd in four Columns towards Parma ; and that the Maſhal de Villars was intrenching himſelf along the Po. It is reported, that the Muſcovite Fleet, conſiſting of 25 Men of War and Frigates, was arrived at Pillaw, eight Leagues from Dantzick. My Lord Forbes, his Britannick Maſteſty's Miniſter Plenipotentiary to the Czarina, arrived here laſt Night on his Return to England. According to Advices from the Rhine, the Trenches before Philipsbourg were opened on the 2d Inſtant.

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
