**T**HE two Armies continue still in the same Posture, and by the Accounts from the French Camp, it appears that the Imperialists had not yet made any Motion towards Parma. The Report of the Finalese having revolted against the Republick of Genoa is confirmed, and that the Inhabitants throughout the whole Marquisate of Final had set up a Standard with the Arms of France, Spain, and Sardinia.

*Hambourg, June 15, N. S.* The Danish Court returned on the 12th to Altona, accompanied by the Margravine, who had been at Aurich to see her Daughter, and assist at the Marriage of the Hereditary Prince of Ostfrise with the Princess of Bareith; the Celebration whereof has concluded with a Mourning, occasioned by the Death of the reigning Prince. M. Brackel, the Russian Minister, received Advice by a Staffette on the 11th, that the French Ships were returned from Dantzick into the Road of Copenhagen, and had brought with them a Russian Frigate of 32 Guns, and three Merchant Ships of other Nations, taken about the Height of Pillau, laden with Ammunition for the Russian Camp. Upon this Incident, he presented a Memorial Yesterday to the Council, representing it as an Act of Hostility contrary to the Reservation which the King of Denmark made in Favour of his Allies, when he allowed the French the Use of his Ports; and therefore reclaiming his Danish Majesty's Assistance against them as Enemies and Aggressors. The Court has returned no Answer yet, but an extraordinary Council was held in the Afternoon, at the Conclusion of which a Courier was dispatch'd to Copenhagen. The three Merchant Ships, one of which is English, having been unladen, were immediately released. These Ships bring Advice, that the Russian Squadron, consisting of about 20 Sail of different Sorts, is actually before the Mouth of the Vistula. The Emperor having granted a Neutrality to this Town in Favour of their Trade, they are now raising the Contributions with all Speed for the Service of his Imperial Majesty and the Empire.

*Hague, June 18, N. S.* The States of Holland have this Day resumed their Assembly. By Letters from the Rhine which arrived here Yesterday we have Advice, that the Duke of Berwick was killed the 12th by a Cannon Ball in the Trenches before Philipsbourg. The same Letters add, that the Garrison having opened the Sluices, which overflowing the Trenches, 600 French had been drowned therein; and that Prince Eugene designed to pass the Neckar as Monday last. The Hereditary Prince of Ostfrise has notified to the States his Son's Marriage with a Princess of Culmbach Bareith.

Their Majesties and the Royal Family returned hither Yesterday from Richmond.

This Day being the Anniversary of His Majesty's Succession to the Crown, there was a numerous and splendid Appearance at Court of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment their Majesties on that happy Occasion. The Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired, and all publick Demonstrations of Joy were made.
