AT the Court at Kensington, the 11th Day of July, 1734. PRESENT, The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, that the Parliament which stands prorogued to Tuesday the Sixteenth of this Instant July, should be surther prorogued to Tuesday the Thirteenth Day of August next. And that the Convocations of the Provinces of Canterbury and York, which stand prorogued to Friday the Nineteenth of this Instant July, should be further prorogued to Friday the Sixteenth Day of August next.

W Hereas by an Order made by his Majesty in Council, on the Fourth Day of June, in the Year of Our Lord One thou-fand seven hundred and thirty three, upon Information that the City and Kingdom of Tripoli in Africa was visited with the Plague, and that there was Reason to apprehend that other Places adjacent thereto were likewise infeeted; his Majesty was pleased, out of his great Care and tender Regard for the Preservation of his People, and to prevent the Infection being brought by Ships or Veffels coming into the Ports of this Kingdom from any of the faid Places, to order and require, that all Ships and Vessels which were at that Time arrived and not unladen, and all such Ships and Ves-fels which should thereaster arrive in any Port of this Kingdom, from any Port or Place on the Coast of Africa in the Mediterranean, between Cape de las tres Forcas in the Kingdom of Fez, and Cape Rozat in the Kingdom of Barca, should make their Quarantine for Forty Days, to commence from the Day each Ship or Vessel should come to Anchor in the Place appointed for performing such Quarantine: And whereas his Majesty hath this Day received Advice, that the Plague hath ceased in those Parts for some time past, and that a Communication hath been opened, and Commerce carried on in the same manner as before the Plague broke out there; His Majesty being always desirous to encourage and promote the Trade of his Subjects, and to remove all Obstructions thereto, when consistent with the Sasety of his People, hath thought fit to order in Council, and doth hereby order accordingly, that all Ships and Vessels which now are arrived, or shall hereafter arrive in any Port or Place within this Kingdom, from any Port or Place on the Coast of Africa in the Mediterranean, between Cape de las tres Forcas in the Kingdom of Fez and Cape Rozat in the Kingdom of Barca, be permitted to enter or come into fuch Port or Place, in the same Manner, as

if his Majesty's said Order in Council of the Fourth Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and thirty three had never been made. And the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Master General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and his Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Dantzick, July 10, N.S. Yesterday the Capitulation was signed, immediately after which a Regiment of Foot, and another of Dragoons, with about 50 Men levied by the Primate, marched out of this Town, which by the Capitulation are Prisoners of War. All Search after King Stanislaus hath hitherto been fruitless and it is repeatly believed been fruitless, and it is generally believed here that he has escaped to Marienwerder. This Day the Elector of Saxony was proclaim-ed King of Poland by Sound of Trumpet, and

to Morrow the Cannon will be fired.

Berlin, July 13, N. S. We have certain Accounts here, that King Stanislaus is at Marienwerder, a Place belonging to the King of Prussia. That Prince came thither on the 3d instant, quite alone, in a Peasant's Habit, and in an ordinary Cart, which was drove by a Boy. At the Barrier being strictly examined by the Guard, he defired them to carry him to the Commandant, who is Colonel Roko, of Major General Bodenbroke's Regiment, which is quartered in that Place. The Capitulation of Dantzick is not yet come to Hand, but Letters from thence say, that Four hundred thousand Crowns are to be paid by the Town in three Weeks from the Date of the Capitulation. As to the other Six hundred thousand, General Munich leaves them Room to hope for some Abatement from the Clemency and Generolity of the Czarina, to whom the Town is to fend Deputies, in order to make their Submission. In Consideration of this and other Favours received from General Munich, the Town has made him a Present of Thirty thousand Ducats. The Primate would not sign the Act of Submission to King Augustus; he told the Russian General, that there he was and the the Town ral, that there he was, and that he might do with him what he pleased. It is said that King Stanislaus is removing from Marienwerder towards Konigsberg.
