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Francfort, August 8, N. S.

**T**HE Army of Prince Eugene is arrived in the Neighbourhood of this City, the Right extending it self to Meerfelden, which is about three Leagues and half from hence, and three from Mentz, and the Left at Geinsheyn upon the Rhine: It is thought that they will in a Day or two pass the Maine at Slengingen, whither the Bridge of Boats which was at Mentz is bringing. It is reported that the Marshal d'Asfeldt, whose Army is encamped in the Neighbourhood of Oppenheim, will pass the Rhine there, and advance towards Prince Eugene. The King of Prussia is to set out from the Army the 12th for Wesel, though it is believed that his Majesty will defer his Departure if there should be any Likelihood of Action. Prince William of Hesse arrived here Yesterday.

*Hague, Aug. 13, N. S.* The King of Prussia is shortly expected here from the Imperial Army, in order, as it is said, to consult Dr. Boerhaave at Leyden. The States of Holland have resolved to give the vacant Troop in the Horse Guards to the Son of M. Vander Duyn, one of the College of the Nobles of this Province. Letters from Dantzick advise, that the Court had dispatched the Univerfalia for holding the particular Dietines in the Provinces, and that of Polish Prussia was to be held in Fifteen Days; that the Russian and Saxon Troops were to decamp in a little Time; that the first would take their Route towards the Places where the

said Dietines were to be held, and that the latter would go and post themselves in Great Poland. These Letters add, that M. Rewuski had been declared Regimentary, and that he is to command a small Body of Troops, composed of 2000 Russian Dragoons, 1000 Cossacks, and the Regiment of Guards which was heretofore in the Service of King Stanislaus.

*Whereas I Peter de Bordes de Bercheres, Esq; Eldest Lieutenant in his most Christian Majesty's Guards, was, on Monday the 8th of July last, at Nine a-Clock at Night, assaulted in the Mall in St. James's Park, and wounded in the Arm by John Langley, of Colonel Mordaunt's Company, in his Majesty's Third Regiment of Foot Guards, and robbed of a rich Purse embroidered with Gold and Silver, with this Motto, Celui qui donne l'aumone est beni de Dieu, containing 26 French new Louis d'Ors, and a fine antique Gold Medal of Caesar Gordianus, on the reverse Side whereof a Victory with this Motto, Victoria Augusta; and whereas the said John Langley has since deserted, I the said Peter de Bordes de Bercheres do hereby promise a Reward of Three Guineas to any Person or Persons who shall apprehend the said John Langley, in order to his being prosecuted according to Law. NB. The said John Langley, of the County of Bedford, Labourer, is Five Foot eight Inches three Quarters high, about Thirty two Years of Age, or thereabouts, of a plain Physognomy, flat Nosed, black and thick Hair, black and swarthy Eye-brows, thick Lipped, black Beard, of a reddish Complexion, a little Sun-burnt, and walks something aukwardly. And whereas George Stacy, of about Twenty six Years of Age, wearing a light brown bob Wig, and of a small Stature, Shoemaker, living in Three King Court in Chandos-street, is an Accomplice of the said Robbery, having concealed Part of the stolen Goods, and has since absconded himself; I do hereby*

promise a Reward of One Guinea and a half to any Person or Persons who shall apprehend the said George Stacy, so that he may be prosecuted according to Law.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy; These are to give Notice to all such Widows as aforesaid, whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August, 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged, with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, and also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford and Woolwich, and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle such Widows to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose: But such Widows as live at too great Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbett, Esq; at this Office, who will send them all necessary Information.
