Hague, Jan. 11, N. S. The Yacht for Mr. Horatio Walpole, his Britannick Majesty's Ambassador here, is arrived at Helvoetsluys, and his Excellency proposes to embark for England within Three or Four Days. Our latest Advices from the Imperial and French Armies in Germany, are, that there was a great Mortality among the Troops on both Sides, caused by malignant Fevers. From Italy we do not expect News of any further Action, the Forces on both Sides being settled in Winter Quarters.

Admiralty-Office, Jan. 7, 1734.

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty being informed, that, notwithstanding His Majesty's Pleasure, signified to his Consuls residing in Foreign Parts, several Masters of Ships and Vessels belonging to His Majesty's Subjects which have come into the Ports where they the said Consuls reside, have upon their Demand, refused to produce to them the Passes which they have received, in order to their endorsing the same in the Manner they are required to do: Their Lordships do therefore hereby give Notice, that it is expected all such Masters of Ships or Vessels coming into any Port where there is any such Consul, do, at their Peril, strictly comply with his Majesty's Pleasure, by producing to them the Passes in their Possession; and that when any Ship or Vessel belonging to his Majesty's Subjects shall be sold at any Port abroad, where a British Minister or Consul doth reside, their Masters do deliver to such Minister or Consul their Passes; or if no such Minister or Consul, transmit them as soon as possible they can to this Office, in order to their being cancelled, that so they may not, to the Prejudice of the Trade of His Majesty's Subjects, fall into the Hands of Foreigners, otherwise their Bonds will be put in Suit with the utmost Severity of the Law. And their Lordships do hereby give Notice to all Masters of Ships or Vessels belonging to His Majesty's Subjects who may receive Passes, either from this Office, or from any of the Governors of His Majesty's Foreign Islands or Plantations, that by an Act passed in the Fourth Year of his present Majesty, it is made Felony, without Benefit of the Clergy, if any Evadement or Alteration whatsoever shall be found made in any such Passes. Whereas an anonymous Letter directed to Madam Miller, on Mays Hill, was on Tuesday last the 24th Instant, about Ten o'Clock in the Evening, thrown into the Court Yard of Mary Miller, Widow, in the Parish of Greenwich, in the County of Kent, subscribed P. S. T. F. L. R. J. N. G. L. B. D. M. E. C. S. J. R. threatening, that, in Case she did not that very Night, leave Ten Guineas under a Brick, the third Post downwards from her Door, she might be sure to have her House surrounded and plundered, and afterwards Burnt to the Ground, and her Young Son taken away, and disposed of in the West Indies, that she might never see him more: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in so heinous a Crime, is pleased to promise His most Gracious Pardon, to any one concerned in writing the said Letter, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he, or they, be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whitehall, January 3, 1734.

Whereas Informations have been given upon Oath, That on Thursday the 19th Day of December last, about the Hour of Seven in the Evening, Six armed Men, with their Faces muffled and disguised, rushed with Violence into the Dwelling-House of Ambrose Skinner, a Farmer, at Long Bridge, in the Parish of Barking, in the County of Essex, and after having bound his Hands, compelled him to walk about his said House with them from one Room to another, to discover where his Money and Effects lay; after which they took his Purse and Keys out of his Pocket, and therewith attempted to open all the Chests and Trunks belonging to him, his Son and Daughter-in-Law, who dwell in the same House with him, but finding the said Keys did not answer their Expectations, they immediately broke open all the said Chests and Trunks, and took from thence, and from his said Dwelling-House, upwards of Forty Seven Pounds in ready Money, with several Pieces of Plate, Goods, Linnen, and wearing Apparel, to the Value of Three Hundred Pounds; and also two Horses out of the Stable of the said Ambrose Skinner, to enable them to carry off their Spoil. And that on Saturday the 21st Day of the same Month, about Six in the Evening, several armed Persons, with their Faces disguised, some with Black, and some with White Colouring, violently entered into the Dwelling House of William Mason, Keeper for the Right Honourable the Earl Tilmey, at Heynault-Lodge in Waltham Forest, in the Parish of Dagenham, in the said County of Essex, and one of them immediately shot at him, and afterwards beat and abused both him and his Wife; and upon his en-

deavouring to make his Escape, the said armed Persons fired thrice more at him, that is to say, once in the Passage of his said House, and twice after he had got out of his House, and that it was with great Difficulty that he, his Wife and Daughter, escaped with their Lives: And that after he, his Wife and Daughter, had fled out of the House, the said armed Persons ransacked it, broke several Chimney Glasses, great Quantities of China, Tables, Corner-Cupboards, Chests, and Glass Windows, and took from the said House One Hundred and Forty Pounds in ready Money, Nine Silver Spoons, Twelve Guns, and wearing Apparel: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the above-mentioned Robberies, or either of them, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of the said Persons who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Facts, or either of them, so as he or they be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a farther Encouragement, His Majesty is also pleased to promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds for every one of the Criminals who shall be discovered and apprehended as aforesaid, to be paid upon the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders.
