**H**IS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

*An Act to punish Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.*

*An Act to indemnify Persons, who have omitted to make and subscribe the Declarations contained in the Act of Uniformity of the thirteenth and fourteenth Years of King Charles the Second, within the Time limited by Law, and for allowing further Time for doing thereof.*

*An Act for repairing the Roads from the Town of Manchester (leading through Newton, Failsworth and Oldham in the County Palatine of Lancaster) to Austerlands in the Parish of Saddleworth in the County of York.*

*An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act made in the twelfth and thirteenth Years of the Reign of her late Majesty Queen Anne, Intituled, An Act for repairing and amending the Highways between the Town and Village of Tittensor and the most Northern Part of Talk on the Hill in But Lane in the County of Stafford.*

And to two private Bills.

Warsaw, March 17, N. S. Count Braniski and the Commissaries sent to the Palatin of Kiovy, arrived here on Monday last; they confirm that every thing is settled with him and his Army, and that he is now Re-

gimentary of King Augustus, with Promise of being made Great General at the first Dyet; the Number of Troops that remained under his Command are in all about 5000, and he only waits Orders from this Court how to dispose of them. In Consideration of the Palatin of Cracow's having quitted his Pretensions to the great Generalship, he has obtained a Pension to the Amount of 60,000 Dollars a Year. By the last Accounts from the Palatin of Volhinia, though he pretended being inclined to make his Peace with this Court, and had assured the Palatin of Kiovy that he would conform to whatever Resolutions he took, he is march'd with his Division to join M. Poccey in Lithuania. We have News of the Palatin of Lublin's having attack'd a small Garrison of 300 Men the Saxons had at Karga, very near the Frontiers of Silesia, and the second Day the Saxons wanting Powder, capitulated to be sent to Posen, having had only one Man killed and one wounded.

Berlin, March 26, N. S. We have received Advices, that the Poles are retired from Zeulichau, Oblat, and Croffen, but whether these Advices do not mention. The King of Prussia designed to remove from hence to Potzdain on Thursday last, but was prevented by Accounts of the unhealthy Situation of the Place, several of the tall Grenadiers having lately died there of a malignant Fever. The Hereditary Prince of Brunswick came hither on Thursday last, in order to fetch the Princess his Consort.
